

Plan annual market

Goodwill Juniors share fruits of labor

Home canners take pride in their work and wouldn't dream of giving their efforts away, except to relatives and best friends. But the women of the Junior Group of Goodwill Industries do just that, every year.

The Junior Group was formed in 1932 and, since that time, women have been spending innumerable hours each summer canning to stock the Pantry Shelf at the annual Goodwill antiques market and sale.

"Canning recipes have been handed down for several generations," explained Mrs. Robert Edwards of Beverly Hills, as she finished a batch of chili sauce. "Everybody cans."

She explained that when the Pantry Shelf part of the annual show began in 1958, Goodwill Juniors worked in groups in members' homes. Now, most of the canning is done at the Brush Street plant, but still by volunteers. More than 1,500 canned goods will be ready by show time, Nov. 13-15. This year's 28th annual show will be at Fairlane Manor, Dearborn.

EACH ITEM to be canned has its own committee; for example, the chili sauce committee. Work groups are organized from the 250 active members (about half of which are from Oakland County) and this year's 18 probationary members. The "probies," as they are called, must work 75 hours to become eligible for full membership.

Items being made for this year's market and sale include chili sauce, fruit chili sauce, Maurice salad dressing, bread and butter pickles, chunk pickles, spaghetti sauce and jams.

"There are 22 committees organizing and running this year's antique show," said Mrs. Edwards. Proceeds directly benefit the handicapped of Goodwill Industries and the League for the Handicapped, with which it merged several years ago.

The amount of the proceeds is greatly boosted by items donated.

THE VOLUNTEERS ALSO make items for the Gingerbread Corner, a booth of holiday ornaments, decorations and gift items at the market.

"The items are made in workshops in volunteers' homes," said Shirley Peterson of Birmingham who, along with probationary member Judy Owen of Bloomfield

Township, assisted Mrs. Edwards in a canning session at the Edwards home.

MRS. EDWARDS explained that the three-day annual show and market is "a learning experience." This year, 46 dealers from the United States and Europe will show and sell their antique furniture, jewelry, prints, clocks, silver, china, glass, pewter and many other items.

In addition the Goodwill Booth will sell antiques, collectables and items of quality gathered by the League-Goodwill during the year.

Honorary chairmen of the market are Gov. and Mrs. William G.

Milliken and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford II.

The market will be launched at an invitational champagne preview from 7 to 10 p.m. Nov. 12 at Fairlane Manor, with the show opening the following morning at 11:30 and running to 9:30 p.m. daily through Nov. 25.

In addition to canned goods, handcrafted items and the high-light, antiques, the Juniors will also man an old-fashion ice cream parlor and country store featuring candies, cheeses and homemade breads. Lectures on antiques will be at 11 a.m. each show day.

Show chairmen include Mrs. William Miller Jr. of Detroit,

chairman of committees; Mrs. Max L. Gardner of Grosse Pointe Farms, chairman of exhibitors;

Mrs. Richard R. LaDue and Mrs. Arthur Wisley, both of Bloomfield Hills, chairmen of publicity,

antiques market; and Mrs. Edwards, publicity chairman, Junior Group of Goodwill.
