## Legislators override education bill veto

Colleges, universities and local schools have won a resounding victory in Congress recently with the override of a presidential veto of the \$8 billion education appropriations bill. All area legislators supported the override.

Approximately \$8 billion is allocated for higher education and elementary/secondary education. Other provisions are programs for the handicapped, libraries, vocational education, adult education, emergency school aid and impact aid.

Bi-partisan support was evident last week as the House voted 273-41 and

the Senate, 88-12 in favor of the override. The bill which funds educational programs for the 1975-76 year, allows for advanced planning in school funding, explains a legislative source.

President Ford vetoed the bill because it was \$1.5 billion over his original request, resulting, he said, in a fiscally irresponsible package.

Perception of the budget was cited by an aide as causing the split between Congress and the President. The amount of the deficit is debatable, as well as revenue expectations.

Rep. William Ford (D-Taylor) fought for the education bill originally and voted to override the president's veto. Ford, whose district includes Westland, Garden City, Canton Township and part of Livonia, realized that if the bill was defeated, local property taxes would have to be increased, said a Ford aide.

Rep. James Brodeur (D-Detroit), whose district includes Redford Township, Southfield and Farmington, supported both the original and override vote.

Rep. James Blanchard (D-Pleasant Ridge) also supported the original and the override votes.

The two area Republican representatives, Marvin Eack (R-Ann Arbor) and William Broomfield (R-Bloomfield Township), voted in favor of the override. Eack, whose district includes Plymouth and most of Livonia, felt the program was too important to cut back, said his aide.

Broomfield, whose district includes Avon, Bloomfield and Bloomfield townships, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms and Franklin, saw no alternative method to providing schools with the needed funds. He voted for both the original bill and the override, but wanted to eliminate impact aid, which compensates school districts for federal employees who reside in the area.

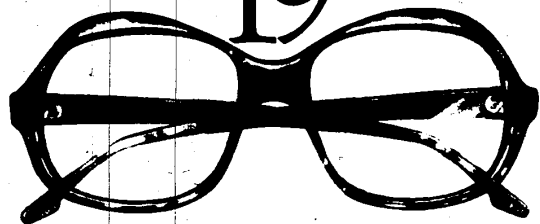

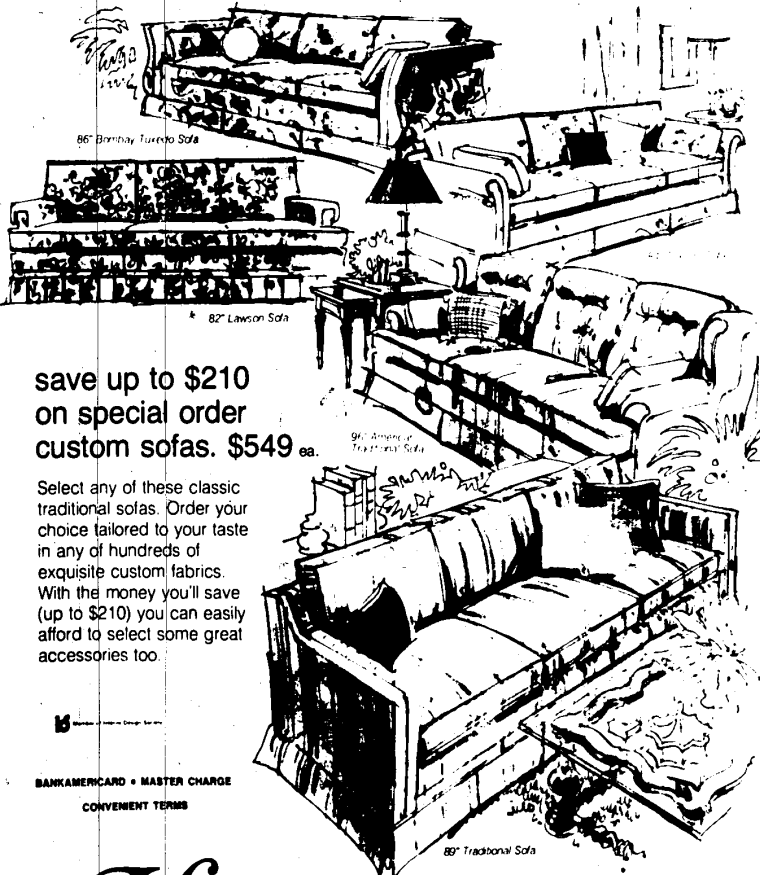
