The hand in the diagram was dealt at a local duplicate last week. It was played in hearts six times and in spades twice. When hearts were trumps the declarer made 12 tricks. If spades were trumps only 11 tricks were possible. With spades as the trump suit declarer had no way to avoid losing a diamond and a club. If the contract was hearts, declarer could still trump two diamonds and discard a club on the fifth spade.
