

Spartans spoil Farmington homecoming

Livonia Stevenson needed some big breaks to beat Farmington High, 10-6, Friday in the Inter Lakes League opener for both teams. And Farmington seemed more than willing to oblige the Spartans.

Stevenson got the only break it needed on the first series of downs. Farmington quarterback Dave Cleveland threw an interception into the arms of John Lokar. Stevenson had the ball at midfield.

Spartan QB Jim Dalmatich then tossed to flanker Bill Rowley, the play gaining 30 yards and setting up the only touchdown of the game—a 10-yard pass play from Dalmatich to Lokar. Rowley kicked the extra point. Farmington's defense got tough after that. For example, defensive end Marty Popp sacked quarterback Dalmatich four times in the game, in-

cluding one for a 15-yard loss which spoiled a Spartan drive. But coach Jack Beardon's Stevenson club didn't need another touchdown. The Spartans were doing quite well with ball control, making their lead stand up. Farmington had the ball for just 10 plays in the second half.

Stevenson's offense also started to move after halftime. In the first half, Farmington held the winners to just 37 yards on the ground. After intermission, the Spartans rolled up 112 yards.

"IT WAS A well-played game on both sides," Beardon said. "We moved the ball a lot better in the second half, and I was glad to see that. We needed that after having minus four yards against Livonia Franklin."

Lokar, an explosive runner,

amassed 102 yards in 20 carries. Spartan fullback Chuck Demarco followed with 42 yards in 19 tries. Farmington's leading ground gainer was halfback Bert Herzog with 34 yards in six carries.

Farmington's offense produced 63 yards on the ground and 20 more through the air on five of eight pass completions.

"We beat ourselves in the first

half," said Farmington coach Hal Beardonley. "We gave them good field position and a lot of breaks."

STILL, BEARDLEY'S squad showed a lot of spunk on defense. In the second quarter, Herzog ripped off an 18-yard gain and gave Farmington the ball on the Stevenson seven. But on the next play, a Falcon runner fumbled and Stevenson recovered.

Stevenson was unable to move the ball and Farmington got it back after the punt.

Again in the fourth quarter, the Falcon defense showed its worth. Stevenson had the ball on the Farmington 10. Lokar carried to the seven and then to the five. Then Lokar carried up the middle for what looked like a first down on the two. But he was just short, and Farmington took over on downs.

With time running out, Farmington moved the ball out to the 20 before the drive spluttered and the Falcons had to punt.

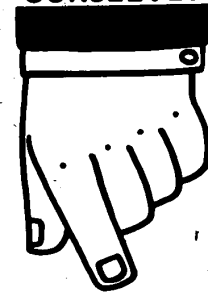

Farmington runners close in on 2nd-straight league title

Coach Gerald Young's Farmington High cross country team is seeking its second-straight Inter Lakes League title. And the way things are going, the Falcons just may reach that goal.

The ILL cross country title has been solely on the league meet scheduled for Oct. 18, but Farmington has defeated some impressive ILL teams in dual meets this season. Farmington defeated Millard Lakeland, 21-30, in an ILL meet last Thursday at Bogie Lake Country Club.

Lakeland's Pete Coley finished first (16:09). Farmington's Stuart Glatfelter was next (18:27). The Falcons took the next three places: Harold Rilla (18:40), Marty Walker (18:51) and Jim Brown (18:58).

"We've beaten the two teams—Livonia Stevenson and Lakeland—which should give us the most competition in the league meet," Young said. "Indications are that we should win it again, but one never knows."

N. Farmington-John Glenn

North Farmington nipped Westland John Glenn, 27-28, in a Northwest Sub-

urban League meet last Thursday. The Raiders took the first two places with Dave Good (16:08) and Dave Levy (16:29), but Glenn took the next three—Gary Miller (16:35), Ted Ussell (16:38) and Bill McCook (16:37). North Farmington sophomore Clay Scowcroft finished sixth (18:38).

The victory lifted coach Ed Davis' North Farmington team to 2-4 in NSL meets and 5-1 overall. North lost to Walled Lake Western earlier this season.

Harrison-Thurston

Farmington Harrison defeated Thurston High, 17-20, in a nonleague meet last week. Harrison's Mike Redford took first in 15:45. Thurston's Lou Syracusani followed in 16:38, and Harrison's Eric Weiner was third in 16:41. The win left coach Larry Fortner's Hawks at 2-2 overall this season.

O.L. St. Mary-Christian

Orchard Lake St. Mary defeated Southfield Christian, 23-22, last Thursday in a Class D meet. St. Mary's Jim Doherty finished first (16:30). The Eagles' best came from Eric Larson, who finished second in 17:40.

Earlier, Christian beat Country Day, 30-41. CD's John Neville finished first (16:30), and Larson finished second (18:40). Christian, coached by Carl Tichenor, will run its home meets at Dodge Park in Beverly Hills.

Berkley-Southfield

Berkley downed Southfield High, 27-31, in a Southeastern Michigan Association meet. Southfield had the first two spots with Scott Stone (15:42) and Mark Volante (16:14). Berkley took three through five: Blue Jay Mike Bryan was sixth (18:37).

The loss dropped Southfield to 1-3 overall. The Jays' lone win came in the opening meet against Waterford Kettering.

Groves-Lathrup

Birmingham Groves had an easy time with Southfield-Lathrup, 16-44, in a Metro Suburban Association meet last Thursday. Coach Jim Crosby's Groves squad took the first three places for an automatic victory. Joel Menges (16:06), Martin Miller (16:25) and Joel Manger (16:39) led the field. Lathrup's best man was Dave Clifford, who finished fifth (17:30).

The City of Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a proposed amendment (Resolving Request #25-0-75) which would rezone property located in the southeast 1/4 of Section 19, Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, being more particularly described as:

Lots 21, 22, 23 and the north 30 feet of Lot 24, and Lots 29 and 30, and the southeasterly 400 feet of Lots 65 and 66 of Park 783 Subdivision, Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, according to the Plat thereof as recorded in Liber 42 of Plats, Page 80, Oakland County Records.

This property lies northwesterly of the intersection of Orchard Lake Road and 12 Mile Road and surrounds the existing uses which are located directly at the northwesterly corner of the intersection.

The above-mentioned request would remove said land as follows:
Lots 21, 22 and 23 from their present OS-1, Planned Office Service District classification, to B-2, General Business District Classification;
Lots 29 and 30 from their present OS-1, Planned Office Service District Classification, to B-2, General Business District Classification.

The easterly 400 feet of Lots 65 and 66 from their present R-2.1, One-Family Residential District Classification, to B-2, General Business District Classification. The southeasterly 400 feet of Lot 24 and Lots 29 and 30 are presently zoned B-2, and would not be affected if this parcel was rezoned as requested.

The proponent in this matter is the Boco Development Company who seeks this rezoning change in order to develop a shopping center on said property. Any person who is interested is invited to participate in the discussion of the proposed amendment in the Zoning Ordinance.
