

Children are offered program variety

The Farmington Community Library, 3237 Twelve Mile, will open a series of programs for pre-schoolers and early elementary age children starting next month.

Some require registration, others don't.

Registration is required for the story hours for three, four and five year olds who are able to sit attentively with several breaks for a 30 minute period without parental attend-

ance. Enrollment is limited to 20 per group.

Story hours will be offered at the following times:

Mondays, 10:30-11 a.m., Nov. 3, Dec. 8, ages four and five.

Tuesdays, 10:30-11 a.m., Nov. 4, Dec. 9, ages three and four.

Tuesdays, 2:20 p.m., Nov. 4, Dec. 9, ages four and five.

Thursdays, 2:20 p.m., Nov. 6, Dec. 11, ages three and four.

Fridays, 10:30-11 a.m., Nov. 7, Dec. 12, ages three and four.

Stories will be a repeat of those given in October.

Creative dramatics for four and five year olds will meet every Tuesday afternoon, 1:30-2, Nov. 4 to Dec. 9. Enrollment is limited.

A nature activity-crafts class for first and second graders will be offered on Wednesday afternoons, 4:15-5:15, Nov. 5-Dec. 10. Enrollment is limited.

Creative dramatics for first and second graders will be held on Monday afternoons, 4:15-4:45, Nov. 3-Dec. 8. The program will include music, stories, puppets and pantomime. Enrollment is limited.

Registration for these programs begins Monday, Oct. 20 in person by a parent, 9-11 a.m. at the library. After that, registrations will be taken either by phone or in person. Farmington and Farmington Hills residents are given preference.

No registration is necessary for programs for pre-schoolers held twice a month on the first Monday afternoon or third Thursday morning. The opening program, Monday, Nov. 3, at 2 p.m. will be, "Three New Adventures with Mole."

School age programs will be held twice a month at 2 p.m. on the second and fourth Saturdays beginning Nov. 8. This first hour long program will be an exploration of American Indian culture.

Two special programs will be held in November. The first is the week long celebration of Children's Book Week, Nov. 17-22.

The Farmington and Farmington Hills libraries will sponsor a contest for pre-schoolers through sixth grade. The entrant who comes closest to guessing the number of books in the children's room will win a book prize (\$10 limit for book of the winner's choice).

It's pure guesswork because the library always has more books than are on the shelves.

Pre-schoolers are invited to a birthday party, Wednesday, Nov. 19, 2-2:30 p.m. The guests of honor are the library gerbils, Chip and Dale. There will be movies and refreshments.

Red Ball drive wins approval

Red Ball stickers have the approval of the Farmington and Farmington Hills police and fire departments and the public school system.

The stickers are to be placed in the upper left hand corner of the windows as viewed from outside the buses in rooms where children or invalids sleep.

In case of an emergency firemen or other rescue persons are alerted to the room where someone may be helplessly waiting.

The Farmington Area Jaycees, providing the Red Ball stickers as a community service, say they could speed rescue operations by life-saving seconds.

Questions, answers from FAAC

The following questions and answers are from the Farmington Area Advisory Council, FAAC. FAAC is the sponsoring organization for Helpme Crisis Intervention Telephone Service, Youth and Parent Counseling Service and substance abuse education services. Q: My girl friend is 13 and wants to run away from home. Can I get into any trouble if she comes to stay with me?

A: Anyone under 17 who runs away from home is legally considered a delinquent. If a report is made to the

police, they can look for her and attempt to return her to her home or to the custody of the boys.

Any person who knowingly harbors a delinquent or knows of her location and will not provide the parents or police with this information can be prosecuted. If found guilty, the charge would be contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Encourage your friend to work for constructive solutions. She can get individual and family counseling by calling FAAC.

Q: When am I emancipated?

A: Emancipation means that you are on your own. Your parents no longer have a duty to support (feed

clothe and educate you in their home. Nor under the law do they have the right to tell you what to do. You are emancipated when you are 18 or married, or on active duty in the armed forces, or when your parents emancipate you by written release, by abandoning you or by actions which clearly indicate an intent to release you.

Q: Is alcohol a stimulant?

A: No. The apparent stimulation is caused by lessening of the inhibitors by the narcotic action of alcohol. Alcohol is actually a member of the ames (the series of drugs. It is chemically related to ether, chloroform and other anesthetics.
