West led the king of spades. The hand in the diagram was dealt at the Swiss Team event at the Motor City Regional at Cobo Hall last weekend.

At one table, Betty Pope of Birmingham was sitting South. When her partner overcalled the opening with a two notrump (a conventional call showing a two-suited minor suit hand) she jumped in diamonds.

North competed to the six level and East doubled the diamond slam.

When it was replayed at the other table, the auction was identical up to a point. Harry Philip, of Royal Oak, was West and decided wisely his hand was an offensive type, not a defensive one.

He bid six hearts, the opponents doubled and Harry made his doubled contract.

Representatives from the Veterans Administration and the Social Security office will be available to answer questions about benefits for veterans, dependents, widows and orphans.

Information on employment for veterans—where the jobs are and how to apply for them—will be available from industry representatives and the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

In addition, vocational, personal, and academic counseling will be offered by members of the OCC counseling department.

Admission to the stadium will require proof of veteran's service such as a discharge record, VA file number or present service record.
