## Smith triumphs in Hills council contest

The long-lought battle for a city council seal in Farmington Hills has been won by Joanne Writth, who turned out to be the high you've getter in this week's election. Mrs Smith received 2.35 votes, winning a four-year seat Placing second was Jan Dolan, with 2.18 votes, third, Krith Deacon, with 1.285, and fourth Mayor Earl Opperhauser, will 1.882 votes, Opperthauser is the only one of

those elected who will serve a two-year term.

The big loser was Councilman Wil-liam Ortman, who got 1548 votes.
Also losing was challenger Bernard Ortsty, who received 1,375 yotes.

Mrs. Smith ran in the city's first election two years ago, failing to gain a seat by 38 votes, when she lost out to Ortman Many observers felt the should have been marned to the coun-cil last year when Margaret Scheffer was elected as district judge. But she

didn't receive majority support from the council at that time and Jan Dolan was appointed, friggead a "I'm really gratified at the observance," said Mrs. Smith. "It's showed that the voters were trying to say something two years ago when I lost by that narrow margin." She expressed optimism over the future of Farmington Hills, naming park development and emergency medical service as two areas of priority.

"I think we are getting ready for the potential that is Farmington Hills." What ald "What we become depends on what we do now."

Mrs. Smith believes the parks situation should be dealt with before open acreage is used up. "The city must be willing to buy land in order to acquire the space needed for parks. If we don't make plans now, the city will develop and nothing will be door." She said.

Consolidation with the City of Farm-

ington must also be seriously looked into, she said.
"I want there to be open discussions about this issue," she said. "There are many people in oily government that are sure this (consolidation) is miner to harmon."

are many people in way activities that are sure this iconsolidation is going to happen. Critics opposed to consolidation are correct, she says, when they point to services that Farmington Hills hasn't developed.

"But, we have some things the City of Farmington would like to have, such as the industrial park and epen land. Our problems don't stop at the border." he said

Keith Deacon, also elected to a four year term, expressed dismay over council colleague Earl Opporthauser's poor showing at the polis.

### Hartsock tops ticket in city; Bennett wins as the newcomer

City of Farmington voters gave their majority support to incumbent Councilmon William Hartsock in Tunsday's election. Mayor Ratph Voder placed second with, newcomer Alton Bennett taking the third seat. The unofficial vote tally showd Hartsock leading the five contenders with 1,118 votes. Yoder garnered 831 votes and Bennett utilied 708. Hart-sock and Yoder will serve four year terms, with Bennett serving for two years

Losers were Alton Holm, who tal-lied 518 votes and James Moore who drew 530 votes Hartsock, a 25-year-old accountant,
