**SPEAKERS FOR** the occasion will be Rev. William Smith, Rev. Robert

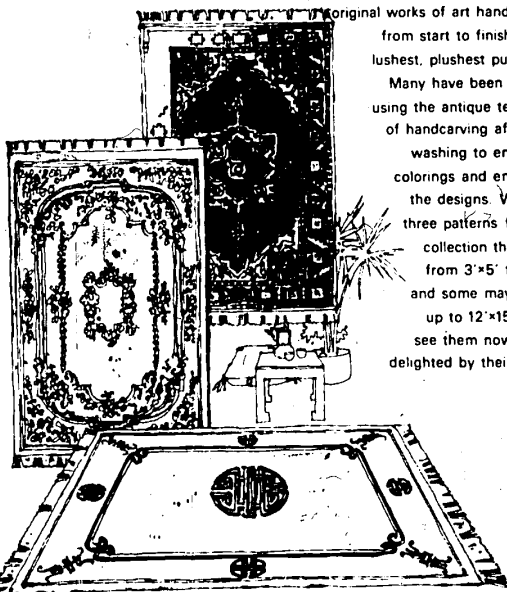
Goudie, Rev. Carol Johns and Rev. Arthur Parkin, all of whom entered the ministerial ranks from Clarenceville Church.
