## 'Church family' share 100-year heritage

The members of Salem United Church in Farmington are also members of another group, "our church

This does not exclude anyone. Anyone can come and worship here, but we try to keep this feeling of being a family." said the Rev. Carl Schultz. paster of the church since 1336

pastor or the courter since 1500

The Salem United Church is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year Through the last century the congregation has grown from about 50 families to 150. Rev Schulz said. And Farmington has grown along with it

"Farmington has changed from a small community to an urban community," he said, at he sai behind a brown wooden deak in his small office

"When we came here in 1936 everyone was a neighbor. You just didn't know any strangers "Now, he said, you always see strangers when you walk downtown

Remaining open-minded, he doesn't assess the changes as being good or bad, but he does admit. "It's too bad you can't continue a whole atmosphere like that."

With the "church family" he hopes to keep some of that atmosphere around, he said

THE SALEM UNITED Church was built on its present site at Oakland and Grand River in 1902 Additions in 1925 and 1958 brought it to its present size

Salem United was the result of the unification of three different churches Originally a German evangelical, in 1934 the Evangelical Synod North America merged with the Reform Church of the United States making it the Evangelical and Reform Church

In 1957, the Evangelical and Reform Church joined the Congregational Christians, forming the United Church of Christ

Salem United's small membership works at maintaining its family feeling by working, as well as praying, together. Different groups in the church have undertaken special projects, like the renovation of the basement of the

building or the painting of an in scription honoring the 100th anniver sary on the arch leading to the sanc

The members take pride in the church, Rev. Schultz said, particularlyin the church windows. Made of multi-colored stained glass in designs of leaves and grapes, they give the inside of the church a mellow glow.

The windows were "probably imported" when the church was built, besaid, because the United States had "not developed stained glass here yet."

Their pride comes from the sentimental as well as monetary value of the windows, he said

One window over the main entrance bears an inscription in German declaring the building an Evangelical Church

THE ORIGINAL FOUNDERS were all German. Rev Schultz said, and the background of the church is German

The present altar, lectern, baptismal font and pews are the originals, he said, and are all made out of carved wood. The wooden floors creak when you walk down the main asle, and the doors are dark, heavily stained wood with iron handles.

Salem United is one of the few churches to have belts still rung by hand with a rope. Rev Schultz said lie estimated they were made 'around 1902,' and an inscription on one indicates, they came from Northville

The church has celebrated its anniversary with many special projects including German dinners and pancake breaklasts. The Ladies Guild has raised funds for improvement of the church and for donation to a home for the aged in Saline.

Two special Sunday services were held in commemoration of the evert, one on May 18 and one on Oct 12 Called "special Sundays" one was in recognition of the church's past, the other in recognition of the church and the community

"It was recognizing where we are now. We're not living in the past anymore,, and hopefully we're a benefit to the community."
