Homecoming service by area churches

The Reverend Tracy Pullman, minister emeritus of First Unitarian Universalist Church of Detroit, will return to the area from Boston, to participate in First Church's third annual homecoming.

The 5 p.m. service on Sunday, Nov. 23, will be an "In-gathering to the Mother Church" of Unitarian Universalist Congregations in Gross Pointe, Birmingham, Southfield, Uica, Downriver and Farmington.

With the exception of the Farmington church, which pre-dates First Church, all have their roots in the Detroit church.

This year's homecoming theme is "Remember, Renew, Rejoice."

The first part of the service will focus on Unitarian Universalist heritage as the nation celebrates the Bicentennial. The Red Door Players of First Church will present three scenes from George Bernard Shaw's Revolutionary period play, "The Devil's Disciple."

Dr. Pullman will speak as will the Rev. Rudolf Gelsey, First Church's current minister.

Also participating in the service will be the Rev. Nancy Doughty, former minister of education at First Church, Fred Campbell, newly installed minister of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church; the Rev. Robert Marshall, minister of the Birmingham Unitarian Church; and the Rev. Frank D. Gentile, minister of Northwest Ucaan Universalist Church of Southfield.

A combined choir will sing. The professional and recreational hymn will be original lyrics written to the theme by the Rev. Frank Gentile.

Acting in the scenes from the Shaw Play will be Gertrude Winston, Pietro DiGeorge, Mike Longo, Judith Longo, Jim Hawken and William Hart.

Following the church service, the homecoming will move to McClellan Hall, adjoining the church on Forest, for a harvest celebration and sharing of freshly baked bread, fruit and cheeses.
