## BRIDG

Defensive card play is one of the more difficult phases of bridge. A new player quickly learns that he can discard a high card to indicate he wants his partner to lead a suit. The more difficult aspect is the definition of a high card. Also it is not always clear when discarding whether partner or declarer gains the most.

In the hand in the diagram, East demonstrated some lack of consideration of these facts.

The bidding warrants little comment. South chose to make the sacrifice early and East was more impressed with his five hearts than its partner's cue bid.

Declarer ruffed the opening lead and made a poor choice by winning the club ace to lead a second club in the hope of using the heart ten to ruff the third qub.

This gave East his chance to error. On the second club, he discarded his "high" diamond eight to show the ace. When South finally led the diamond six, West could see all the smaller cards. He thought his partner's "low" card indicated he did not have the ace. West played the king and the ace went on the same trick. One of clarer's losers had disappeared.

East made two mistakes. Obviously he thought the ight had to be a high card. More important, however, is the fact that he had no need to try to show the ace for the card in due course without the discard.
