Grow these gifts

Christmas lists are often filled with inanimate objects: bedspreads, jewelry, toaster-ovens and stuffed animals. But have you ever thought of giving a living gift for Christmas—a plant?

b Giving plants affords the giver a chance to be creative. Design a terrarium, hanging basket or a cactus garden, for example. These gifts also serve as constant reminders of the giver.

Giving a plant can be expensive or not. If you are on a very strict budget, consider taking clippings from your own plants, rooting them and replanting them in a colorful_handerafted basket or handpainted tin.

If you want to add a little extra to your gift, accompany it with a plant sprayer or a set of small gardening tools. Other accessories include items used in growing healthy plants: lights, plant food or books about plant care.

Where money is no object, the size and expense can reach as high as you like. A lasting and thoughtful gift for a friend or relative who is fond of the tropics might be a palm tree, handsomely planted in a bamboo or seashell-covered container.

When buying plants, keep in mind the interests and space the recipient has. If the person has little leisure time, a cactus that requires little water or attention would please more than a coleus which has to be constantly trimmed and watered.

If the person lives in a small apartment, a terrarium might be preferable to a six-foot swaying palm. If the recipient's home is not well illuminated by the sun care must also be taken to select a plant that does not require much light.

Allergies must also be taken into consideration.

Containers for plants or plant stands can be gifts themselves and they can be as simple or ornate, as inexpensive or luxurious, as the pocketbook allows. Grandma's old treadle sewing machine can become a great planter for an an-
