

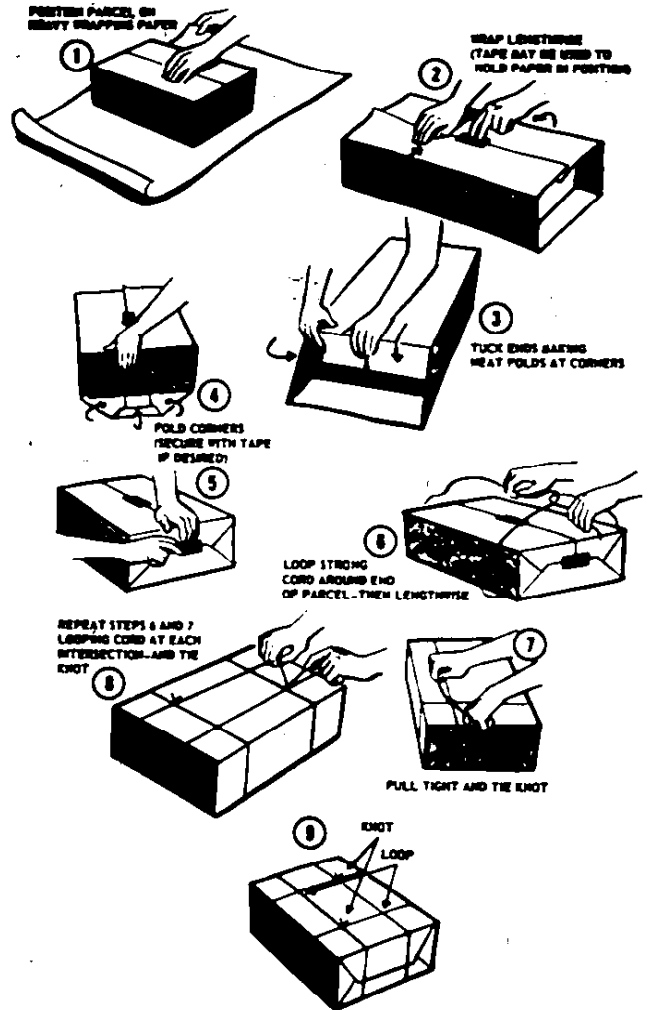

Handle with care

Packages marked "Handle with Care" may not always be, especially when the Christmas rush reaches the post office and employees there struggle to get cards and packages delivered on time.

To ensure your gifts arrive safely at their destination, package them with care yourself and as the post office always admonishes, mail your packages early.

If you follow the post office's hints for packing, wrapping, tying and marking, plus its special regulations regarding liquids and battery operated machines, you will be almost certain that Aunt Lydia's perfume makes it through the maze of post offices, trucks, trains and planes, necessary to get to its destination.

Packing should be done with as much care as was taken selecting your gift.

The post office cannot ensure that packages will not be tossed about or hit other packages, therefore it suggests using a box large enough to provide space for cushioning but small enough so that contents don't shift.

If you don't have a box the correct size, a larger one can be cut

down by marking the desired height on the side, splitting the sides down to that height and cutting off the excess, leaving enough to form enclosing flaps for the top.

The type of box used depends on the weight of the item. For most average loads (up to 10 lbs.) a paperboard box will suffice.

If heavier than 10 lbs. are to be sent, a stayed paperboard or solid or corrugated fiberboard box is best, unless the package requires wood, metal or plastic.

The best filler to cushion gifts and absorb shocks is a loose, light material, like polystyrene, shredded newspapers, compressed tissue paper, cloth or expanded plastic (the air bubble clear sheets).

"Less dense, loose fill materials are most effective in force distribution. Shock and pressure forces must be dissipated over as much of the surface of the item as possible, the post office says in its available to the public booklet, "packaging for mailing."
