The amount of the city's supple-ment on these loans would depend upon the amount of the family meetine of the homeowner. In no case would the homeowner have to pay more than six per cent or less than three per cent interest on the loan Market interest rates for this type of loan, said Deadman, rage from 12 to 13 per cent. Funding of 86000 for thus program would supplement be-tween 825000 and 835000 of home re-novation in the city

IN ANOTHER move to avoid blight, the plan would give approximately \$13,000 towards local street and road repair. The repairs would be in older subdivisions where the roads need re-

This program, which started with much less than 100 riders a month, now exceeds three times that many." sud Deadman "The service has pro-ved to be a very successful and worth-while program However, with the un-creased ridership on this service, the city's contribution to the program has now reached the point that it is cost-ing close to \$2,000 a year."
