Bring back the putz

As the yuletide season approaches each year, The Stroller suffers pangs of regret that one of the most fascinating of all Christmas customs has been side-tracked and pushed to the abyss of forgotten things.

This is the old Moravian custom of building what they called a putz in their churches and in many cases in their homes to display the Christmas tree and the Nativity scene. The putz is a platform on which the tree is placed and folks worked for hours on end to outfit each other in portraying the scene and the spirit of the season.

That's why, at this season in early December, The Stroller gets a feeling

of homesickness and yearns for another trip through the foothills of the mountains and a visit to Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, where the scene is best portrayed.

When The Stroller was a young lad, the city of Bethlehem was a city of putzers, and not only because it was the home of the Bethlehem Steel Company, but because it boasted one of the oldest Moravian settlements in the country. And at Christmas it was a joy to visit.

This was the background of the putz. But along the way the three Wise Men were to travel such distances as small waterfalls, open and sheep roaming in the fields, and all this in all-some scene. It was as close to the Holy Lands as could be portrayed.

The steel church erected a huge star in the old South Mountain and at night this star of Bethlehem would be seen for miles. Meanwhile the Moravians prepared the official putz in the basement of the church, hard by the banks of the Lehigh River.

This putz was no ordinary job. It was a masterpiece and required most of the floor space in the basement. When it was finished people came from miles to cut off the top banks of the Lehigh River.

THE STROLLER well remembers one of the prize winners. It was different and a thing of beauty.

The chap who built it invaded the neighboring woods and cut off the top

of a sassafras tree instead of taking the usual evergreen. After getting it home he wired the branches and the trunk, then covered the sticky surface with cotton.

Widely spaced placed several mirrors, then a few pillows to give the effect of mountains and covered the entire area with white sheets, leaving the mirrors to stand out as lakes. Over the sheets and the tree he sprayed synthetic snow and used blue bulbs for tree lights. You can imagine the beauty of such a setting when the lights were turned on.

To make the setting all the more colorful, this chap also placed candleabras in each window from the basement to the attic. When the shades were drawn the lights stood out for long distances to let folks know that the putz was on display.

It's too bad this custom is fading away for it was one of the most fascinating of all Christmas displays.

And if The Stroller were asked what he wanted for Christmas he could think of nothing better than the return of the old Moravian custom of the Christmas putz.

Study women's programs

A national study of women's programs at community colleges has been completed by Dr. Don Nichols, dean of students, at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus.

The study resulted from Nichols' role as advisor of the Womencenter, a campus and community organization which sponsors programs for women. Nichols will be presenting his findings at the American Association for Junior Colleges Convention next March in Washington, D.C.

"The interest in, and success of, our program made us wonder about what was happening at colleges across the country," he said.

An 88 per cent return was achieved on a survey sent to deans of 800 colleges and is seen as an indication of the great interest in programs for women, he said.

The survey indicated that 77 per cent of the deans were interested in Women's issues (for campus and community members). The Nov. 25 session will feature a panel discussion on survival economics.
