The garden therapy classes stem to 1850 in Farmington schools Before that, the only such classes were held in hospitals and nursing homes.
The local club took up the project with the assistance of Alice Bulnagame, hort-therapsis and author of 'Hoe for Health' and with 20 women working in four schools with 64 children, began its first class in the spring of 1861.
HILL AND DALE members now make be monthly visits to 21 class-

rooms, and provide garden properts adapted to more than 223 youth attend to the project include planting, growing and arranging flowers; conservation of wild life and plants. 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Hill and Dale won its first award, the Michigan Award of Ment from the Federated Garden Club of Michigan, for its program in 1945 since then it has gathered up a considerable number of awards for its work in garden therapy and has worked to sponsor the same program with other garden clubs in the metropolitan area.
