Mercy, a real powerhouse in Class A girls' basketball, has been there be-fore, making the state finals for the past two seasons. And things look good for another trip to state again this season.

"They're starting to take the regional victories for granted," said Mercy coach Larry Baker, who never even watched a gris' basketball game until the accepted his first teaching job—and the basketball coaching sasignment—at the Parmington all-gri Catholic school last fall.

Mercy has been winning its district and regional games by wide margins, outscoring opponents, 353-146, in five tournament games including the re-gional final.

The victory lifted Mercy to 18-2 this season. The Marlins have lost to De-troit Bishop Borgess during the regu-lar season and to Detroit North-eastern in the Public School League-Catholic League championship game.


