Library plans kids' programs

Children are invited to a variety of activities planned by Barbara Shumer, children's librarian, in the Farmington Hills Branch of the library, 32737 12 Mile.

Free activities will be provided for preschoolers twice a month, beginning in January, on the first Monday afternoon and the third Thursday morning of each month. Pre-school nursery participants are encouraged to make appointments, but registration isn't necessary for the Monday and Thursday activities.

Three animal films are set for Monday, Jan. 5, beginning at 2 p.m. Three films having to do with coloring will be shown, Thursday, Jan. 15, beginning at 10:30 a.m. For this activity, children are asked to bring a purple crayon.

Open programs for school-aged children will be on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month beginning at 2 p.m.

Registration is necessary for the Jan. 10 session when a representative from the Humane Society will talk about animal care. Registration is unnecessary for creating a snow beast, hot chocolate and a movie on Jan. 24.

REGISTRATION IS necessary for all of the following programs, beginning Monday, Jan. 12, in person by a parent from 9-11 a.m.

Story hours, designed for the 3 to 5-year-old who can sit attentively for a 30 minute period will run Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, for different age groups at various times. In addition to stories, children will be involved in songs, puppets and creative dramatics.

For first and second graders, a six-week creative dramatic series will be held, beginning Wednesday, Jan. 20 and Thursday, Jan. 29, with children learning to know themselves better through mediums of sound and speech, literature and music, and sight and touch. This involves use of imagination, not memorization of lines. Registration is limited to 16.

For this same age group, a nature and craft class will meet Tuesdays at 4 p.m., beginning Jan. 27. Class enrollment is limited to 20. There is a \$1 materials charge, due at the time of registration.

Third and fourth graders may sign up for colonial crafts, where they will learn how to make and do things as the early Americans did them. This class will meet Friday afternoons, at 4 p.m. beginning Jan. 30. Class enrollment is limited to 20.

OPEN PROGRAMS for preschoolers are set for twice a month, on the second Friday morning and the fourth Tuesday afternoon. Registration is unnecessary.

On Friday, Jan. 9, at 10:30 a.m. is a puppetry show. On Tuesday, Jan. 27, at 2 p.m., a rhythm review will be conducted. Rhythm instruments, such as pie tins, spoons, or other percussive objects available in the home, are required for each participant.

Friday, Feb. 13, at 10:30 a.m. is "Creepy Friday" which celebrates Friday the 13th, with movies, stories and creative dramatics. "The 3 1/2's," Harold, Horton and Homer" comes in film on Tuesday, Feb. 24 at 2 p.m.

OPEN PROGRAMS for school-aged children will occur on the third Saturday of the month at 2 p.m. Registration isn't required.

Saturday, Jan. 17, the library plans a riot of movies. "Pee-wee's Playhouse," "Superman," and "The Great Annual Bathing Race." Saturday, Feb. 21, at 2 p.m. another film festival is set with "Outer Clowns of the Sea," "Pee-wee Had a Little Ape," and "Ponies."

3 suspects nabbed in store robbery

Farmington Police apprehended three black youths last Saturday morning after they allegedly broke into the Goodyear Tire Store, 33014 Grand River, Farmington and left with three color television sets valued at \$1,300.

Arrested and arraigned in Farmington District Court on charges of breaking and entering were Darnell Ray White, 20, of 18000 Dillmore, Verneil Washington, 17, of 12940 Susee, and a juvenile, all of Detroit.

According to police, a silent alarm tipped the department to the burglary. Two cars responded to the early morning break-in and gave chase to the fleeing suspects.

At 4:45 a.m., Saturday, Dec. 20, Patrolman Anthony Gubacz arrived on the scene, saw the broken window and tire tracks showing the direction of the burglars' escape. Gubacz notified Sgt. John Santomauro and Officer Greg Wilson, who were on their way to the tire store of the burglars' flight.

Santomauro and Wilson saw the car leaving an alley with its lights off and began their pursuit. There was a short chase, but they apprehended the youths about one-quarter-mile from the store.

According to Public Safety Director

Darnell Byrnes, the chase might have resulted in a high-speed get-away if it was not for the snow and ice which prevented the youths' escape.

White and Washington remain in custody of the Farmington Police Department and the juvenile was sent to the Oakland County youth center.
