The important aspect is to include as many youths, and their activities as possible. Besides hearing from the traditional scouting groups, we would like to hear from the rest of you. That includes the high school kids.

We know the community's youths are doing fine things out there. So give us a chance to tell about it.

So often the proverbial cry is heard that only the bad things the youths do are printed in the paper. This space is provided to do away with that feeling.

Our first entry comes from Boy Scout Troop 48, of the North Farmington Baptist Church, Farmington Hills. They recently conducted a court of honor inducting two members into the Eagle Scout ranks.

Those inducted were Mark Haight, 32933 Hargrove Court and Rich Wright, 32501 Thirteen Mile. Both scouts are in the leadership corps. Haight also is the scribe-recorder for the troop.

Guest speakers were the Rev. Michael Karoub and Rev. John Morel of St. Leo Parish in Detroit. Also speaking was Glenn Black, Troop 48 scoutmaster.

Archie Black, Craig Lewis and Joe Zolt were in charge of the Eagle investiture.

The Eagle award is the highest rank that can be achieved by a scout. To win this award, a scout must earn more than 20 merit badges.

The Clinton Valley Council of the Boy Scouts, which includes the troops in the Farmington area, will hold three events at Pontiac Stadium in the coming months.

The first will be an annual meeting and fellowship dinner Jan. 17 at the stadium club. The evening will include a speech by William "Green Bar Bill" Hillcourt, life-saving awards, induction of new officers, ceremonies, entertainment and recognition.

Hillcourt was formerly director of program resources of the Boy Scouts of America. His column under the name "Green Bar Bill" appeared in Boys' Life magazine for many years. He also authored many handbooks for scoutmasters, boy leaders and scouts.

Active in scouting since 1911, his latest book, "Baden-Powell: The Two Lives of a Hero," is a biography of the founder of the Boy Scout movement.

On Jan. 21, committees from many troops will meet at the stadium for the kickoff for the summer Scout-a-thon.


