Miss Wanda Graham of Mayfield Avenue returned home Sunday night from a most enjoyable vacation trip during which she visited in Chicago and various places in Canada.

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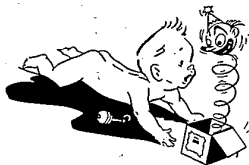
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
