**POST OFFICE JOBS OPEN, SAYS TROMBLEY**

Civil Service examination for probational appointments for the position of Substitute Clerk-Carrier at \$1.615 per hour was announced today by Henry L. Trombley, Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners.

Applicants for this examination must reside within the delivery of the Farmington Post Office or be bona fide patrons of such office. Persons employed in the post office will be considered bona fide patrons of the post office. Present employees holding temporary or indefinite appointments should file for this examination if they wish to be considered for permanent appointment. A written test is required of all applicants.

Interested applicants should complete card Form 5000-AB and mail it to the Director, U. S. Civil Service Region, New Post Office Building, Chicago 7, Illinois. The application blanks and full information may be obtained from the secretary at the post office.

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Roberts on Mayfield Avenue is undergoing some extensive remodeling.


