

Sarah Roth is soloist

Born into a musical family, Sarah Roth was expected to be musically inclined. It turned out just that way.

Miss Roth will be soloist when the Plymouth Symphony performs Haydn's cello concerto in D major in the annual family concert. It begins at 4 p.m. Sunday in Plymouth's Salem High School auditorium, Joy west of Canton Center roads.

Miss Roth is the second of seven children, and everyone in the family is a musician. Four of them play with the Plymouth Symphony — Sarah; her father, William, viola; her mother, Louise, string bass; and her brother, Charles, principal second violin.

"My parents wanted us to be in strings," Miss Roth recalls. "My sister had already taken up the violin, and I kind of liked cello. I took it up in fifth grade."

After a stint with the Livonia Youth Symphony, she joined the Plymouth Symphony four years ago, meanwhile growing to an impressive but well-proportioned six feet, ½ inches in height.

Her long list of honors includes being one of a handful of soloists in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival competition in both 1972 and '73.

A 1973 graduate of Livonia's Bentley High School, she attends the University of Michigan on a tuition scholarship from the Interlochen Arts Academy and is a pupil of Oliver Edel in Michigan's School of Music.

"Why the Haydn concerto? "It was the one I was working on," answered Miss Roth innocently. She also has cello works by Schumann, Saint-Saens, Kabalevsky, Boccherini and Lalo in her repertoire.

And when she isn't performing classical music? "I like to play the guitar, sing folk music and listen to what they play on the radio — what do they call it now? rock? pops?" She also indicates that she and other students have become acquainted with the sound of a Bell on Liberty Street in Ann Arbor.

Her ambition? "To play with a symphony."

WHEREAS, The bearer has serenely struggled through the tedious renovation which will turn the Prince and Pauper into the area's leading dining and dancing spot;


