Millage election debated

are continued, expenditures will exceed revenues by \$1,045,208. "It is expected each mill of local tax will produce revenue of \$46,385 for 1976-77. Therefore, 2.3 additional mills should be the minimum additional millage required to balance the budget," Prisk commented.

"However, because of the provision of the State Aid Act, additional local revenue will cause a decrease in guaranteed state aid improvement. This means that if there is a 6 per cent increase in state aid, the district must maintain the same millage. If

they increase it, state aid will be reduced by the increase.

"In our case, the amount of state aid lost would be \$907,085. Thus, too, would have to be made up by additional local levy which would make it necessary to ask the voters for an increase (additional) in millage of a minimum 3.6 mills," Prisk told the school board.

"The alternative is to reduce anticipated expenditures by \$1,045,208." Prisk said the district has used all monies available to it and that there are still many unknowns at the state level in regard to state aid and whether any further cuts will be made this year.

IF MORE CUTS are made, and if the millage is not increased or renewed, the district might be forced to lay off staff until it knows for sure where it stands in relation to operating funds.

Most board members agreed the millage is an important question and that it should be renewed or increased. Lichtman and Trustee Michael Spiece said that they both favor the millage but are not ready to decide on what the increase or renewal should be.

Trustee Ross, chairman of the board's finance committee, said his panel favored the millage election. He said the committee recommended a four-mill renewal and the possibility of additional increases of as much as four mills. He did not specify the increase, only that it should be presented to the voters in the special April 6 election.

"We are talking about programs for next year that cannot wait until later in the year for the millage question to be decided," said Ross. "We cannot wait to plan our budget and decide the millage for operation in September."

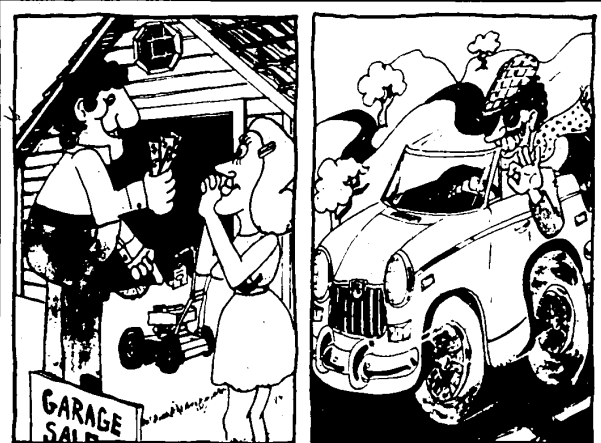

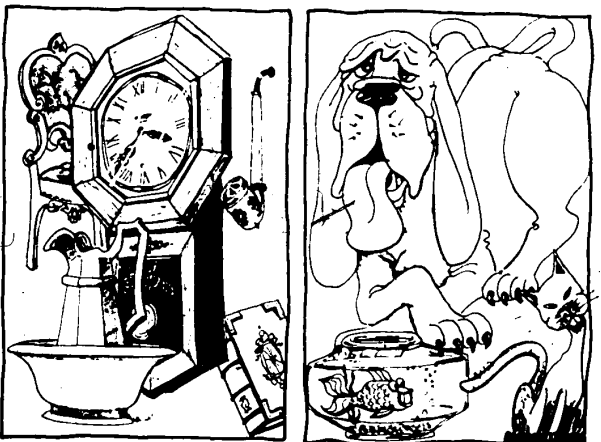
