Learn your witch words

Some of my readers have pointed out to me that I frequently use "witch words" which are not familiar to them. For this reason, I have drawn up a list of such words and their meanings. Lexicon of Witch Words

Part I

abracadabra—a mystical word used mainly for protection; it was usually written in the following way and worn around the neck to cure illness.

alchemy—a combination of chemistry and magic studied in the middle ages. An alchemist tried to find or prepare a liquid which would change cheaper metals to gold, and to cure ailments and prolong life.

aleuremancy—divination (fortune-telling by using meal or flour).

almanac—divination by salt. This accounts for some of our superstitions about salt.

aphrodisiac—anything that increases sexual desire.

apparition—the appearance in visual form of some paranormal phenomenon, for example a ghost who can be seen.

arcana—profound secrets. When spelled with a capital letter, it refers to one of the two parts (major or minor) of the Tarot deck.

Artemis—the mystical goddess of the moon (also called Diana).

arapex—the art of telling fortunes or divining the future by the observa-

tion of birds; factors involved are the kinds of birds, the number, the formation in flight, their flight direction, and the time of day they are observed.

astral body—the spiritual being as opposed to the physical body.

astral travel—out-of-body travel.

asafetida gum—a substance believed to keep away enemies and evil spirits, because of its foul smell. It is commonly called "devil's dung."

athame—a black-handled knife used by witches in preparing materials for rituals, spells or potions.

augury—the general act of divination or "reading" the future.

aura—the field of vibrations surrounding the body.

Baculum—the wand (sometimes disguised as a broomstick) used by witches in various rituals.

bale fire—a ritual fire.

ban—to curse.

bane—a poisonous or bad thing.

Beltane—the April 30 witch festival.



Bibliomancy—this involves closing your eyes, opening the Bible at random and placing your finger on the open page, then reading the verse your finger points to for a special message of divination.

bolinae—a knife with a curved blade, like a sickle, used for drawing ritual circles.

Bright—Feb. 2 witch festival.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING TO REVIEW PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO ZONING ORDINANCE

The Farmington City Council will meet at 8:00 P.M. TUESDAY, February 17, 1978 in the Council Chambers, 2800 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan to hear all interested persons on the proposed amendments to the Farmington Zoning Ordinance as follows:

The following Sections and Sub-sections of the Farmington City Code, Chapter 29 Zoning, are hereby amended, deleted or added as indicated:

ARTICLE 7 - SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS (Schedule A)

CD1 CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT

Sec. 552 (3) (d) Add: new restrictions on commercial recreation prohibits amusement arcade in CBD

Sec. 553 (2) (3) Add: new temporary outdoor use and activities: "a ten day permit to conduct sidewalk sales, art show, carnival, etc. may be issued"

R1 ONE FAMILY DISTRICT

Sec. 552 (2) Removes all uses except one-family dwelling, playground and public parks from Permitted Principal Use

Sec. 554 (2) (4) Re-defines type of schools permitted in the R1 District and allows uses such as public agency, fire stations, public utilities and library

C2 COMMUNITY COMMERCIAL DISTRICT

Sec. 552 (2) Add: new restrictions prohibiting mechanical amusement arcade and mini-theaters

C3 GENERAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT

Sec. 552 (5) Confines regular occurring outdoor sales of goods to specifically designed and approved sales area

Sec. 554 (3) Add: new terms to describe automotive service station and similar type businesses

M1, M2, M3 INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT

Sec. 552 (1) Allows C3 Commercial Uses in Industrial District

Sec. 554 (3) (2) Allows some special exception use as permitted in the C3 Commercial District and allows for the use by automotive and other types of trade schools

ARTICLE 7 - SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS (Schedule B)

CD1 CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT

Sec. 550 Footnote (1) Allows a building of up to 35 ft. in height to be placed in CBD upon approval of the City Council; requires public hearing prior to approval. Includes requirements to be used in reviewing site plan of building over 35 ft. in height in CBD

ARTICLE IX - SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS

Sec. 572 Fences, Walls, Hedges and Greenbelts Adds requirements for height, type, location and maintenance of screening walls and fences

Sec. 573 Mechanical Equipment Requires the screening of mechanical equipment on or around buildings

Sec. 591 (4) (d) Storage of Recreational Vehicles in Multi-Family District Requires recreational vehicles to be parked in approved areas within Multi-Family Districts

Sec. 591 (7) Parking of Commercial Vehicles in Single-Family and Multi-Family Districts Requires that commercial vehicles of over 1/2 ton classification be parked in approved areas within Multi-Family District and that such vehicles may not be parked in the side yard open space in Single-Family Districts

ARTICLE XIII - BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

Sec. 5129 Motor Supply Station Adds new terms to define Motor Supply Station

ORDINANCE C-384-73

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 146 OF CHAPTER 100-TRAFFIC AND AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 422 OF CHAPTER 80-BUILDING REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES

§ 146. Size, Weight and Load. No person shall drive or move or cause or knowingly permit to be driven or moved on any street, any vehicle or vehicle of weight, height, length or weight in excess of the limitations governing size and weight restrictions specified in the Michigan Vehicle Code, Act No. 300, Public Acts of 1946, as amended, except as permitted by special permit issued under the provisions of Section 428 of the Farmington City Code.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES

§ 22 Special Permit Required. In any case where any person seeks to move any building or structure he shall first apply for a permit in accordance with Chapter 79 of this Code. If the building or structure is not to be located within the City of Farmington, he shall in addition obtain a permit as required in Section 436 of this Code. In any case where such building or structure is to be located or relocated upon any lot or parcel of land within the City of Farmington, the applicant shall first obtain a permit under the provisions of this Chapter. No permit required under the provisions of this Chapter shall be issued thereof and the applicant shall have complied with all the requirements of this Chapter.

This Ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on Monday, January 1, 1978, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the Council on January 19, 1978, and will become effective ten days after publication.
