

Fly high in popular pickins' in community education

A group of special classes which have proved to be popular over the years will be offered in the spring term sponsored by the community education division of the Farmington Public Schools.

Classes start the week of March 29 and registration is now underway. It may be done in person, Monday, March 15, 7-4 p.m. in Room 104D, Farmington High School, 2000 Shawnee, or registration forms plus the fees may be mailed in.

GROUND SCHOOL FOR PRIVATE PILOT RATINGS—covers the fundamentals of aircraft structures, aerodynamics, meteorology, flight and radio navigation. Included in preparation for Private Pilot FAA written exam. Upon successful completion of course, students will be awarded a certificate to meet FAA requirements. Tuesday, 7-10 p.m. Room 104E, \$8.

INSTRUMENT GROUND SCHOOL—covers fundamentals of instrument flying, aerodynamics, instruments, radio, regulations, navigation, meteorology and flight procedures. Upon successful completion of course, students will be awarded certificate to meet FAA requirements. Tuesday, 7-10 p.m. Room 104E, \$8.

POWDER PUFF MECHANICS—is for women who want a basic understanding of the auto, its maintenance and troubleshooting. Thursday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104G, \$1.

AUTO TUNE-UP AND REPAIR—uses electronic diagnostic equipment to teach minor tune-ups. Thursdays, 7-9 p.m. Room 104G, \$8.

WELDING—offers basic experience in gas and arc welding techniques. One welding will include fusion-welding, shielded metal arc welding and brazing. Arc welding will include cutting of electrical, joint preparing and welding. Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104C, \$8 with materials costs.

PHOTOGRAPHY I is a course in general aspects of photography including technical aspects of camera taking, use of proper lighting, meters, basic composition and film. Same size of dark room facilities Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104E, \$12.

PHOTOGRAPHY II is an advanced class pertaining the student to pursue the development of personal interests and techniques necessary to produce fine photographs. Wednesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104E, \$12.

GUITAR—is folk style for those who want to learn to play, play simple chords and melodies. Bring guitar, lesson book and guitar first night. Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. or 5-8 p.m. Room 111C, \$12. Specify class time.

WOODWORKING I—is a beginning course for both men and women. After re-

viewing hand tools, various power tools will be demonstrated. They will be used in sanding, planing, determining costs and projects of the student's choice. Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104A, \$15 with materials costs.

INTERMEDIATE BRIDGE (GORDEN)—will cover hand counting, overbidding and bid play. Playing of hands interspersed with instruction. Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104D, \$12.

INTERMEDIATE BRIDGE (GORDEN)—is for those who have had the beginner's course or playing experience. Play of specially prepared hands will be provided by rapid review of bidding fundamentals included will be hand play. Tuesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 104D, \$12.

SPEED READING AND COMPREHENSION SKILLS—is designed to help improve reading rate, comprehension, vocabulary and critical comprehension.

There will be discussion, visual aids and reading with comprehension checks. Wednesday, 7-9 p.m. Room 712B, \$12.

CPR—CARDIO PULMONARY RESUSCITATION—is the method of mouth to mouth resuscitation and external heart massage that forces the heart to pump blood and prevent brain damage which can occur in four to six minutes. 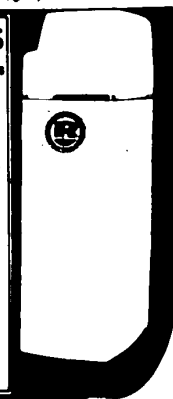

have ever supported the fire department in any way, shape or manner," said the memo.

The firemen also defended their action in threatening to quit, saying such talk was unheard of before. Holko came to the department in the early 1970s.

"Recently, there has been much internal discussion among the men of all four fire stations about resignation. However, the fire department has been in existence for more than 25 years prior to your arrival on the scene, and the discussions regarding resignations have all been in the past

few years since you took command," said the memo.

"IT WOULD have been much better administrative procedure to indicate to the men of the fire department that you feel that they are not dedicated, non-professional and an undisciplined group in some official communication rather than through a letter to the wife of one of the firefighters," the memo continued.

They defended their dedication, saying the wages paid were little compensation for the hours of work.
