

NFHS grad helps OU tankers in NCAA finals

Tom Boyd, Paul Karna and Rod Mitchell team in the top 13 of three individual events last weekend to lead Oakland University to third place in the NCAA II national championships last weekend. The Panthers received points from five other individuals and three relays. Boyd went fifth in the 200-yard individual medley in 1:30.8 and sixth in the 200-

backstroke with a time of 2:01.3. By swimming 1:02.2 in the 200-free relay he took a 13th. Karna, a Rochester High graduate in the NCAA II as he was clocked in the 400-yard relay at 1:54.5. He was fourth in the 400- with a 4:17 time and fifth in the 200- free with a 4:07. With a 1:09.9 clocking in the 200-free

relay, Jordan Hatch earned OU to a fourth in the 200-free relay in 2:02.8. The swimmer secured third place in the final standings by going 3:02.2 in the 400-free relay. For the Panthers, under Gary Van Fleet and Richard Piers, are third in the NCAA II national championships in 74 after taking fourth last spring.

Carl Tischerer, beginning his second year as Southfield Christian's track coach, is excited about the upcoming season. One reason for his optimism is the track turnout—26 boys, a lot for Christian, a Class D school, which also offers baseball as a spring sport. And Tischerer lost just one letterman from last year's team, which finished with a 4-6 win-loss record and then landed sixth in its Class D regional.

"We're looking for a tremendous year," said Tischerer, a transplanted New York City who teaches French at Christian. "We'll be very strong in the distance and middle distance events."

One outstanding distance man is senior Eric Larson, who qualified for the state meet last year. (There are sophomores Kevin Larson, Doug Wright, Jack Meyers, Dave Johnson and Duane Hyer and freshman Bob Kistner.)

"I want to qualify these guys for as many events as possible for the regional."

NOTICE TO CUT WEEDS

It shall be the duty of all owners of any subdivided land to destroy any noxious weeds growing on said property before they reach a seed bearing stage so as to prevent them from becoming a detriment to public health. Any weeds not cut by June 1, 1978, will be cut by the City; and the owner of the property charged with the cost under provisions of Section 1 of Ordinance 278. This will be done as many times as necessary during the growing season. In addition any owner who shall refuse to destroy such noxious weeds as provided for in this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00.

Noxious weeds are those described in Section 2 of Act 208 of the Public Acts of 1941, as amended, and all other weeds, wild grasses and plants the uncontrolled growth of which would constitute a nuisance.

(Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:10 P.M. Monday, March 13, 1978, by Mayor John H. Richardson. Present were Councilmen Bennett, Hartsock, Jarrett and 8:30 P.M. Richardson and Tappan.

City Officials present were City Manager Desmond, Director James, Thomas, Byrnes and Clerk Viane.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Minutes of other boards were received.

Permission was granted to the Farmington Area Veterans organization for the annual Memorial Day Parade on May 31, 1978.

Letter from the Ad Hoc Committee for the Council of the Arts was received.

Council directed that a letter be forwarded to the Chairman of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners and to our representative County Commissioner Jack McDonald urging their support for the consolidation of the Oakland County Department of Public Works with the County Drain Commission, showing our support for an appointed, rather than an elected, Public Works Commissioner.

Council directed City Manager Desmond to contact Dr. Marvin B. Ross, M.D., Secretary of the Farmington Board of Education in response to their request regarding vacant land owned by the School District.

Resolution was adopted accepting the Public Safety Department Command Officers Association as the bargaining unit for the Lieutenant and Sergeants of the Department.

Informal public hearings have been established to determine whether or not residents of Lakemay, Valleyview and Maple Streets are willing to have their roads improved and be assessed for the improvement. Lakemay residents will be heard April 19, 1978. Valleyview residents on May 3rd and Maple residents on May 17th. All meetings will be held at 8:00 P.M. in the Council Chambers.

Min. Dennis Brunkler, 3516 Oakland Street, was appointed to the Recreation Committee for a term expiring in June 1979.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held in Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, on Tuesday the 4th day of April, 1978, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

"In order to renew the four mill operating tax increase which expired in 1973, shall the limitation on the total amount of general ad valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes in any one year over and above the personal property tax in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, be increased as provided in Section 6, Article IX, of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of ten (10) years from 1978 to 1988, both inclusive, by four (4) mills on each dollar (\$4.00 per \$1.00) of assessed value of property as finally equalized, for the purpose of defraying a part of the operation expense of the school district?"

Sophs could help Jays

Southfield High's track team will have a youthful look this spring. Southfield has an unusually large track turnout—more than 30 boys, including 23 sophomores.

"I'm looking forward to things," said Southfield coach Chuck Balog, whose Blue Jays didn't win any dual meets last season. "I'm sure some of the youngsters will come around. Of course, I'd like to win a couple of events while they're coming, but I think they'll shape up pretty good."

"It's a pretty nice group to work with actually. There seems to be pretty good balance with talented people in each event."

Balog is hoping for a good spring from senior Scott Stone, an outstanding runner on Southfield's cross country squad. In track, many coaches feel that Stone has the talent to be one of the best distance men in the state.

"He's real competitive and he's been training real hard all winter," Balog said. "He'll probably run the mile mostly and kind of save himself for the two-mile when he has some decent competition."

Other senior trackmen include Art Hundak (distance events), Gary Miles (400), Mike Bryan (800), and Baldo Aule (400). Sprinters Mitch Moses, Stuart Brogden and Scott Bremner are promising juniors.

"THEY'RE ALL solid runners and they've been working very hard," Balog said.

Some of Southfield's sophomores have been looking good in practice. For example, Dave Walmsley should give the Blue Jays a head start in the 400, a new event in Michigan high school track this spring.

His form and technique look pretty good," Balog said. "He has a pretty good idea of what he's doing. His father was a top-level distance and shot put man in college, and he's been working with his son for quite a few years."

Another sophomore, Ken Raby, got a late start because of swimming, but looks promising in the hurdles, according to Balog.

Southfield will be weak in the long jump and pole vault, but sophomore Kevin Reeve could help out in these events, Balog said.

Southfield will have to stop the Huron Relays, the traditional track opener next Saturday, because it failed to score a point in last year's event. But Southfield will have runners in Michigan State University's Spartan Relays (April 3) and the Marnefield (Ohio) Relays (April 3-10).
