

Get those feet ready: 'Walk for Farmington'

Get out those old walking shoes and start practicing for the annual Farmington Area Jaycee "Walk for Farmington" scheduled for June 1. The Jaycees are hoping for 1,000 walkers this year and 1,000 pledges, compared to

last year's total of 450 walkers and 2,000 pledges. Those interested in participating should contact walk chairman Ron Zurilla at 681-7561. A major change in this year's walk is a shortened route, from 30 miles last year to 15 miles. A different route also is being mapped out for the annual event. "Past experience has shown that many later elementary students participate in the walk and that 30 miles is just too great

a distance for 10 and 11 year olds," said Zurilla. "Also, many adults participating 30 miles seems more like 30 miles." Because many of the walkers are repeat-ers, the route has been changed to offer a little variety. The walk will start from the Board of Education parking lot at Shaw-ness, between Power and Farmington Roads at 9 a.m., with registration starting at 8 a.m. Walkers must have permission from their parents or guardian and will have to have sponsor's pledges obtained in advance. Walkers will have mileage cards verified at one mile intervals. Lunch will be served for walkers, with beverages and some snack items served. The principle behind the "Walk for Farmington" is to raise money through a central campaign for what the Jaycees feel are worthwhile activities for other service clubs who don't have fund raising means at their disposal. In prior years recipients have included the Farmington Area Advisory Council, Farmington Community Center, the YMCA computer program and the Farmington Youth Assistance program. The Jaycees hope to fare better in collect- ing pledges after the walk by utilizing computers to speed up that portion of the project. Last year it took from three to four weeks to collect the pledges and by then some pledges had forgotten their obli- gation, according to Zurilla.

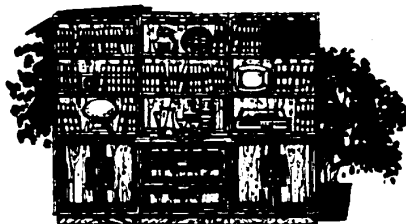

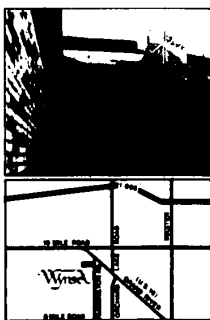
