Oakland County commissioners are expected to consider May 27 a proposal to fund part-time employment for persons aged 55 and older.

The program, financed with federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act funds, is specifically aimed at senior citizens with inadequate personal and social security income.

Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy, who submitted the proposal to the board, said about 15 per cent of the county's population is aged 55 and older, according to the 1975 census.

Funding under Title I of CETA would provide 15 hours a week employment for 90 persons at a pay rate of \$2.30 an hour. Salary plus required fringe benefit payments would bring the total program cost to \$174,136.

If approved, hiring would begin in June

3 Oakland men take top WSU jobs

Martin Barr, vice president for special assignments has been appointed secretary to the Wayne State University Board of Governors and vice-president. As vice-president he will continue many of his previous responsibilities.

Barr, a Southfield resident, succeeds Robert E. Hubbard as secretary of the board. Hubbard, who lives in Troy has been named dean of the College of Lifelong Learning succeeding Benjamin W. Jordan. Dean Jordan has been named assistant to the president for institutional relations, a function previously handled by Hubbard. Jordan, a Farmington resident, requested the change of assignment after serving as dean of the College of Lifelong Learning for five years.

Barr came to Wayne in 1961 from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. He received his B.Sc. from Temple University, his M.Sc. from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science, and his Ph.D. from Ohio State University. Named dean of the College of Pharmacy

in 1964, Barr was named vice president for special assignments in 1972. Hubbard received his BA and Ed.M. from the University of Rochester and his Ph.D. from Ohio State University. He joined the Wayne State staff in 1957 as director of the office for institutional research and associate professor of education.

He was named assistant vice president for academic planning in 1970 and assistant provost for institutional relations in 1972 before being named secretary to the board of governors and assistant to the president in January 1975.

Dr. Jordan received his BS and M.A. from Memphis State University and his Ed.D. from Wayne State University. He came to WSU in 1957 and was director of off-campus credit programs for the College of Education before becoming associated with Urban Education, a forerunner of the College of Lifelong Learning. He was named dean of the College of Lifelong Learning in 1971.

All appointments are effective July 1.

10 troop sites open to scouts

Plans for summer camp at Lost Lake Scout Reservation have been finalized according to John W. Wattle of Farmington, chairman of the camping committee for the Clinton Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America.

The camp located in Clare County will open on June 20 and operate for eight one-week periods through August 14.

To date, 96 of the 104 available troops have been reserved. Wattle reported.

Programs will include aquatic, scoutcraft, nature, field sports and handicraft. Scouts will have opportunity to qualify for most outdoor skill awards and merit badges.

All Scouts in the Oakland-Macomb county area are invited to encamp with their chartered troops. The patrol method of Scouting is utilized throughout the week including cooking and activities.

The camp fee is \$45 per period for chartered troop camping. Provisional camping will be available during the periods beginning July 4, Aug. 1 and Aug. 8 with a camp fee of \$50 as the total cost.

Campers must be officially registered scouts. Reservations are made through each scout's own scoutmaster.
