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Final plans for Schoolcraft College's service building and book store were approved by the board of trustees at the May 28 regular session.

By resolution, the board authorized W. Kenneth Lindner, vice president in charge of business affairs, to advertise for bids for the building. Hopefully, the bids will be opened at the June 25 meeting. A July construction date is contemplated on the project designed by the Livonia architectural firm of Hall, Hamill and Becker. Estimated to cost \$375,000, Lindner pointed out that Fed-

eral funds will pay for 50 per cent of the project, excluding the book store.

IN OTHER ACTIONS, the board voted to tackle construction of a 4-level fine arts center in two phases.

Official go-ahead was given the Chicago firm of Perkins and Will to prepare phase one of the proposed center that will house a fully equipped main auditorium and mechanical facilities.

Initially considering a 1,500-seat auditorium, the board voted to increase the size to 2,000 in anticipation of an enrollment of 10,000 students by 1975.

Only one vote was cast by Dr. George Martin, who felt the auditorium "was too big."

During the discussion it was brought out that in order to attract high calibre entertainers and to break even financially a 2,000-seat auditorium was a prime requisite.

"That's according to the information given us by architectural and theatrical consultants," commented Wayne Dunlap, head of the college's fine arts department.

Trustee Sam Hudson felt a larger capacity auditorium was "worth the risk."

"This area certainly needs something like this," Hudson commented "even if all we get back from it is the social advantage to the community."

FUNDS FOR PHASE one of the center are assured by present Federal funding, Lindner informed the board. Phase two will depend on government approval of the architectural design.

Schoolcraft Receives 4 Scholarships

Four scholarship grants were acknowledged by Schoolcraft College's Board of trustees at the May 28 meeting.

Donors were the newly organized Western Suburban Junior Womens Club, the Plymouth Lions Club, the Plymouth branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and the Ford Motor Co.

The woman's club contributed \$400, the Lions, \$250, AAUW, \$150 and the Ford Motor Co., \$250.

## College Opposes Zoning

Proposed re-zoning of an 80-acre parcel of land south of Schoolcraft College, across Six Mile, will be fought by the school's board of trustees.

The board passed a resolution at its May 28 meeting objecting to the re-zoning request on file with Northville Township's commissioners that would change the present rural zoning to industrial.

The board's resolution pointed out that "an industrial complex would not be compatible with the college, the general area surrounding the college, nor with the interests of the college."

Further, the resolution pointed out that the college's architectural design enhances a residential community and that industrial buildings would detract from the college's overall design.

Main concern of the board lies in the fact that the only avenue of expansion open to the college is south along Haggerty Road. The resolution pointed out further "that steps have been taken to acquire property in this direction."

In March of this year, the board acquired the Cabot property at 17350 Haggerty Road and at the present time the college is assembling, appraising and pricing portions of pieces of property facing Six Mile for appropriate board action.

Hopefully, these actions, along with the exchange program under consideration with the Michigan State Highway Department, will ultimately give the college the 212 acres needed for expansion in view of the 10,000 student enrollment predicted by 1975.

Trustees noted, however, that there is still a stalemate over the exchange program pending a joint meeting with the Federal Bureau of Public Roads who must approve the action.

Meanwhile, state highway officials met again with Schoolcraft administrators at the college June 3 to discuss further the exchange whereby the college would turn over certain land east of the campus for a highway. In return, the state would provide funds for the purchase of land to the south of the college, along Haggerty.

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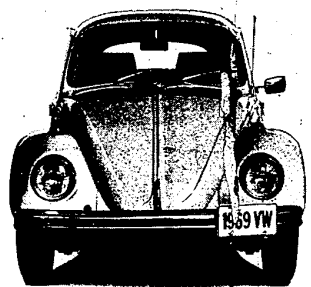
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## Board Meets On Contracts
