

# Telephone campaign spurs drive

Telephone reminders were issued last week by board members of the Farmington Community Center to those former contributors who had not yet given this year. The effort brought total donations to one-third of the center's \$25,000 goal for the year.

"We try very hard to provide as much income as we can," said Mrs. Taylor, the center's director. "The board is working on benefits of some kind all the time. It seems."

The center, in its seventh year of operation, remains unsupported by government endowments. While classes and special events pay their own way through fees charged, there is no surplus for day-to-day maintenance costs or needed repairs, said Mrs. Taylor.

The telephone campaign, conducted from offices donated by Thompson-Brown, was done by Mrs. Harry Shultz, Mrs. Richard and Mrs. Vernon Vickland, Mrs. Jack Mang, Mrs. Gilbert Williams, Mrs. Harold Welch, Mrs. Edward MacLean, Mrs. Will Schuler, Robert Annet, Robert E. Taylor, George Nahatoll, John Allen, Ken Perrin, John Sprys and Will Davis all of whom gave time to make the follow up calls.

Last year, increased costs for fuel, electricity and insurance rates were complicated by a \$4,000 expenditure for a new connection. Overdue exterior repairs and painting being done this spring cost nearly \$5,000.

Generous gifts have been received by the center already this year. A \$500 contribution from the American Association of University Women paid for electrification of a sign at the center's entrance gate. Another gift, donated by the Farmington Rotary Club, is a speaker's podium with built-in microphone.

It is hoped that revenue from the John Glick studio loans will pay for craft tables purchased by continual use. Such items cannot be paid for without contributions from the general public to bridge the gap between service costs and material and repair expenditures, said Mrs. Taylor.

## Farmington High bands join for pops concert

Rebecca Barrett will be the featured guest soloist, performing "Concerto for Flute" by Cecile Chaminade with the wind ensemble. She is a graduate of Interlochen Arts Academy and holds an undergraduate degree in flute performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where she studied with the principal flutist of the Cleveland Orchestra.

The concert band will perform selections from this year's school musical, "Music Man." The entire flute section will be featured with "Happy Go Lucky" by Tom Course. The band will also play "American Variations," by local composer Jerry Bill.

A novelty, in which the life of an American composer is depicted musically, will complete the concert band's portion of the concert.

THE WIND ENSEMBLE will perform two 19th century settings of the Baroque period. It will also play a new and humorous band composition, by Peter Schickel entitled "Grand Serenade for an Awful Lot of Wine and Percussion Instruments."

Another two numbers in the concert have been recently recorded by the band. George Gershwin's "An American in Paris," and Henry Fillmore's "His Honor."

The stage band will take over when guests move across the hall into the cafeteria where refreshments will be served.

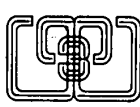
