

Osteopaths meet in convention

The Michigan Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons received more than 1,500 of its members in the Hyatt Regency Dearborn for its 7th annual Post-graduate Conference and Scientific Seminar this week.

Headquarters for the association is located at 33100 Freedom Road, Farmington.

The four day event was highlighted with the installation of Dr. Kirk H. Herrick, a general practitioner in Saginaw and St. Charles who is the new president of the 1,850 member association. Eugene L. Skorski, D. O. of Pontiac, is the retiring president.

HERRICK is a member of the Michigan Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination, a board member of the American College of General Practitioners in Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery and nu-

merous other state and local health care agencies. He has been a member of the Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine's Family Medicine Faculty since 1971.

He has served as chief of staff and also medical director of the Saginaw Hospital, has been a member of the MAOPAS board of trustees for 11 years and has been a delegate to the American Osteopathic Association House of Delegates.

Thirty-one speakers are scheduled at the three day Continuing Medical Education sessions.

"The Problem Child," and "Common Infectious Disease Problems," will be among the 12 general sessions, while special sessions are slated to be held on "Fundamental Electrocardiography" and "Osteopathic Management of the Cervical and Thoracic Areas."
