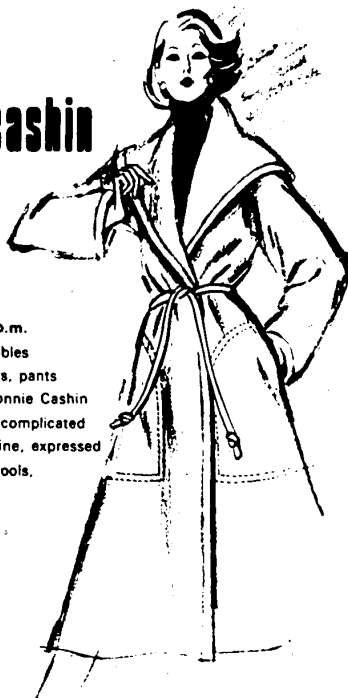

Family Fun Fair coming

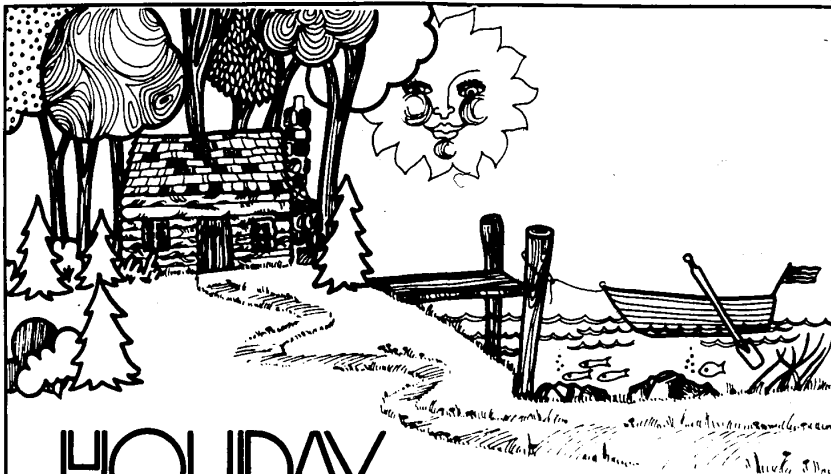

2 prayer rallies set for women

To encourage women to pray for a spiritual awakening at home and throughout their communities as a prelude to the Southeastern Michigan Billy Graham Crusade this fall, the Graham organization is launching two women's prayer rallies early in June.

The first is slated for Highland Park Baptist Church, 2800 Lathrop Road, Southfield at 10 a.m. Thursday, June 10. A twin event will occur the following Sunday, at 4 p.m. June 13 at Chapel Hill Baptist Church, 3800 Joy Road, Detroit.

Headliner for the program is Mrs. Millie Diener, a 38-year veteran of the Crusade Team and considered by Mr. Graham to be one of the world's finest women speakers.

In Detroit, as in other cities, she will urge women to prepare themselves for the crusade through prayer, requesting the ultimate goal of the rallies — that a home be provided on every block in the metropolitan area, opened for prayer.
