

Area netters fall early in state tournament

The luck of the draw turned out to be bad luck for Southfield's representatives in the Class A state tennis finals last Saturday at Kalamazoo College.

Southfield High's Bob Gendelman qualified for the state most singles while teammates Sheldon Krietsman and Howard Tachler earned a place in the doubles play. Southfield-Lathrup's doubles team of Paul Blunden and Marc Israel also qualified for the meet.

But the Southfield players were eliminated in the first round, having drawn tough opponents.

Farmington Harrison and North Farmington also were represented in Kalamazoo Harrison's doubles team of Bob Malitz and Danny Green was eliminated after one round, and North Farmington's David Epstein fell in the second round of singles play.

Portage Northern's Shaefer brothers, Bob and Bill, defeated Blunden and Israel, 6-3, 6-3, in the first round. The Shaefer twins won four more matches and take the state doubles title.

Another brother act, Art Anzor Huron's Gordon and David Kamsar, bested Kriets-

man and Tachler, 6-4, 6-3. The Kamsars were the eventual runners up in doubles play, losing to the Shaefer's 6-1, 6-4, in the final round.

In doubles play, Gendelman drew Mike Balkin of Kalamazoo Loy Norris for the first round. Balkin, who went all the way to the singles final before losing to Holland's Greg Araya, defeated Gendelman, 6-2, 6-2.

"EVERYBODY IN Southfield got the world's worst draw," said Lathrup coach Ed Watts. "We're not as bad as we looked. There were worse players in the tournament than Southfield's. But we drew the toughest opponents right away. Waterloo First round and we're out."

Southfield High coach Dale Freeman had similar feelings. "Our kids really did well and I was proud of them," he said. "They could have beaten a lot of players in that tournament, but somebody had to

play the top seeds. I think our kids were a little awed at the competition. It was their first state tournament, and the kids they played had all been there before."

North Farmington's Epstein, who had beaten Southfield's Gendelman in the qualifying regional, recorded a first round victory over Grand Rapids North's Bill Wierhoff in three sets, 5-4, 6-1, 7-4, at the state meet.

But then Detroit Musford's Walker Robinson defeated Epstein, 6-1, 6-1, in round two.

Harrison's Green and Malitz was the first round loser. Laker Orest's Jerry Mayas and Steve Marasc, 6-1, 6-1, in the next round, defeated Dow's team of Paul Foster and Bob Hachewich, defeated Harrison crew, 6-2, 6-2.

"Green and Malitz looked very good in the first round," said Harrison Coach Bernie Goldstein. "They just ran into an exceptionally good team in the second round. There were a lot of good players up there at state. This was my first experience watching good boys' tennis. All I'd seen be-

fore was the teams on our schedule."

Kalamazoo Loy Norris was the Class A team title with six points. Musford, Portage Northern and Holland shared second place with five points each. In the singles final, Araya's 6-4, 6-2 victory over Blunden was considered an upset by many. Blunden had beaten Araya twice during the regular season.

Detroit Austin won the Class B title with 12 team points, one more than runner up East Grand Rapids. Grand Rapids University Liggett dominated the Class C-D meet with nine points. Kalamazoo Hackett was second with five points.

After another golf tournament in Texas and some meetings with the WHA, Howe will be back in Detroit for a July 17 golf tournament at the Sheraton.

If the Plum Hollow tournament serves only one purpose, to bring this popular athlete back to home territory for a relaxing day with good friends, then it's worth the price of admission.
