IN THE POCKET

Summer bowling in Observerland is growing at a record pace.

There was a time when the bowling centers closed for the summer, but the modern establishments with air conditioning have made toppling lumps a year round activity. Observerland bowlers are more numerous than ever.

This is the trend throughout the metropolitan area. According to Tom McKay, secretary of

the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, this summer's total already has reached last year's peak with more leagues being sanctioned each day.

In keeping with the national trend most of the leagues are mixed, organized as "fun leagues" and there is at least one circuit in each establishment. These leagues do not concentrate on scoring, but make the most of companionship and the good fellowship of bowling with their neighbors.

HIGH SCORING in the metropolitan area was on an average with that of a year ago -- but far below the all time marks. According to GDRA records there were 37 sanctioned 300 games compared to 38 a year ago. There were 25 scores of 299 compared to 24 last year and 110 scores of 284 in contrast to 15 in 1968.

"It is remarkable," Secretary McKay pointed out, "how our bowlers consistently stay around that figure since our record count of 55 perfect games several years ago."

TED BAKATSELOS and the entire Thunderbird Inn girls team will be among the champions fated at the first annual champions dinner being sponsored by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association and the Detroit Women's Bowling Association at Mr. P's at 14-Mile and Van Dyke on Thursday June 12.

The champions of the various leagues and tournaments will be honored at the dinner.

TO SET THE RECORD straight on women's high scores for the year in the Tri-City Association, here are the three highest reported:

1 - 699 rolled by Sue Outmet at Westland on games of 234-234 and 231.

2 - 695 posted by Joan Grill at Town & Country Lanes.

3 - 691 registered by Saddy Via at Garden Lanes early in the season.

WITH TWO MORE weeks to go Pat and Morris Hirsch are still holding on to first place in the Wonderland mixed doubles with their 1271 posted more than a month ago.

William Loessberg and Marie Levin are in second place with 1262, while Margie and Don Tannicola are third with 1244.

DR. STAN BORG, a 153 average bowler, paced the summer league at Livonia Lanes with a 192-227.

Among the other top couals were Marion Heath a 570-93 663 and Betty Herron with a 223-26-251 for high single.

BARBARA SCHMIDT showed the way in the All-Star Ladies Doubles at Garden Lanes with 618 on games of 170, 227, and 221. With this count she held a two pin margin over Betty Kingery who linked counts of 221, 237 and 158 for 616, and Peggy Cole, a team mate, had a 607 on games of 157, 153 and 247, the high single game of the night.

Livonians Up String In Class A

Livonia's Hubert Realty is off and running in high gear in the Greater Livonia Class A baseball league.

Three games -- three victories. That's the story. Hubert's third victim was Livonia's newest entry in the league, Village Rambler, in a 5-0 verdict.

Rick Krumm, fresh from starring at Eastern Michigan, turned in a three-hitter and chalked up 12 strikeouts victims as he kept Village well in check.

Other collegians, past and present, provided the stick-work for Hubert.

CHIP ROSE (Michigan) singled along with Bo Arndell and Roger Frayer (Central) in the first inning to allow Hubert to score two fast runs.

In the second, Jay Schwalm (ex-Easter), was safe on an error and came around on another error and a fielder's choice.

Rose knocked in Harry Swystun, who walked and stole second, in the fourth. In the fifth Roy Tibodeau walked, swiped second and came around on a fielder's hit.

REDFORD TOWNSHIP made it 2-1 in the league by turning back Northville, 8-2, as Rick Berryman worked five innings, fanning eight and allowing four hits, while Dan Prebenda finished up.

A walk to Bob Holmes and singles by Gary Schaefer and Mark Carrow gave Redford its first run in the opening inning.

In the second Robby Masson singled over Lou Banwert to make it 2-1 for Redford.

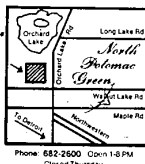
Then followed a three-run uprising for Redford in the fourth inning when Dave Woloch walked along with Berryman, Masson, Holmes and Schaefer followed with hits.

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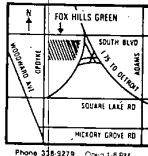


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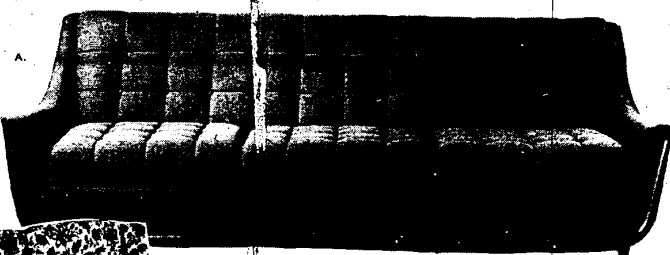


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
