

# Law officials say drug crackdowns aid users

A package of bills directed against Michigan's narcotics traffic has been approved by the State House of Representatives and sent to the Senate The legislation would set mandatory sentences for convicted large-scaledrug dealers and allow the use ourt-nathorized wiretapping in investigations of suspected major narcelist operations.

The City of Southfield has had its share of narcotics violations and drug busts by Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET) officers Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson has clamped down hard on drug cases dismissed in Southfield 46th District Court.
