

BRIDGE

Joanne Shellie of Troy and Marie LaPrise of Royal Oak defeated the spade contract three tricks for a fine score at the Great Lakes Regional held in Midland earlier this month.

They were third overall in the two session Women's Pair event.

The South player in the hand in the diagram made a normal take-out of double of East's third hand opening bid of two spades. When her partner bid diamonds, was a poor choice. A bid of a new suit by the doubler shows a five card suit and a much better hand.

The majority of the North-South pairs were playing a two diamond contract and were making this contract with overtricks.

The club jack won the first trick, declarer ruffed the club continuation and cashed the ace of hearts and ruffed a heart in dummy. The diamond king lost to the ace and Joanne led another club. Declarer led a heart. Marie played the ace and another trump. Declarer tried to ruff a diamond. But East ruffed and played clubs. Declarer took only one more trick, the spade queen.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, June 6, 1977, in the Council Chambers, 23000 Liberty Street, Farmington. Notice of the meeting was posted in compliance with Public Act 267-1976.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Mayor Pro-Tem Richard L. Tupper.

ROLL CALL:

Councilman Bennett, Tupper, Yoder, present.

Councilman Hartwick, absent.

Mayor Richardson arrived at 8:30 P.M.

City Manager Deadman, Director Byrnes, Director Jones, Attorney Kelly and City Clerk Viane were present.

Minutes of previous meetings of May 11 and May 16, 1977 were approved.

Minutes of other boards were received and filed.

Permit was granted to Lucy's Oldies But Goodies, 3335 Grand River, to hold an Antiques and Collectors Show at the Masonic Temple June 18-19, 1977.

City Council agreed to support the time schedule proposed by the federal and state governments for conversion of road signs to metric system.

No action was taken to vacate the alleys running north and south from Adams Street to Shawsheen.

No change will be made in the method of trash pickup for residents on Oakland Street.

Council instructed City Manager to proceed with a cost study for construction of parking facilities on the north side of Grand River showing a projection of costs per property owners to be included in a special assessment district.

Council authorized bring up to six new employees for the implementation of the Central Business District, to be handled through Oakland County CETA funds and also authorized the City Manager to receive bids for the landscaping materials to be used in the Community Development 1977 funds; total project cost not to exceed \$65,750.00.

Payment to McCarthy Contracting Company for first estimate Maple Street paving in the amount of \$7,000.00 authorized.

City Manager authorized to sign Michigan Department of State Highways Maintenance Contract for Grand River covering period from July 1, 1977 through June 30, 1978.

Farmington Historical Commission Annual Report received.

Department of Public Services Quarterly Report received.

City Manager Deadman advised Council of proposed goals of the newly formed Commission on Aging.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:00 P.M.



F. Water heater is energy-saving type, located as close as practical to point of use. Hot water lines wrapped in insulation are recommended.

G. Interior lighting that conforms to the Illuminating Engineering Society standards for energy efficiency in residential lighting.

H. Exterior security lighting, if provided, has automatic dusk-to-dawn control.

I. If home has a fireplace, it must have a tight-fitting damper and glass screen, and if practical, an outside fresh-air supply.

J. Materials, equipment, design and construction of all electric devices and wiring must comply with all local and national codes.
