cause I didn't think anything could top it," he said. But he was eventually talked into "For the Love of Benji," which was filmed on location in Greece.

"Frank has done it again," Camp said. "I think this is even a more sensational piece of animal work than the first one. There's never a moment when you don't know what that dog is feeling, what he's thriking and what he's trying to accomplish."

IN FACT, Camp is so optimistic about the success of "For the Love of Benji" that it bothers him "I feel better about this one then I have about any of the other pictures at this time, and it scares me." he said. "If you're slightly nervous, you can't be too disappointed."

A third Benji movie is not necessarily forthcoming, according to Camp. He said that it all depends on public reaction to this one and his ability to turn out another good script. "We won't put out a picture and call it a Benji picture just to say we made a Benji picture; he said. "I like to think that what we're maybe doing is the kind of thing Disney would be doing if he were alive today."
