Another plan using vans as a basis of senior transportation is being considered by Oakhand County, according to State Representative Sandy Wilbur Refarmington. Oakhand County has proposed to use 28-30 vans seniors throughout its area.

His move comes at the end of his eight-year term as associate pastor of Nardin Park Methodist Church. Rev. Moshauer decided to take a leave of absence rather than transfer to anoth-er parish, according to William Twigg, a member of the Nardineers, the church senior citizen group.

Moshauer was unavailable for comment. But Bruce Robinson, of Robinson Reports. Farmington Hills, confirmed that his firm is recommending Moshauer as a developer to the Canadian real estate firm Collabino Brothers. The firm owns the property, bocated on Van Dyke in Warren, which is slated for senior residences.

In a surprise move last week, Farmington Hills Councilwoman Joan Dudley withdrew as a candidate for reelection to the city's legislative body.
By removing her hat from the ring,
the Hills council elected in November,
will be devoid of all councilmembers who were also members of the Farmington Hills Charter Commission. Earlier this year, Councilman Fred Lichtman announced he wouldn't run for
reelection.

Mrs. Dudley, an East Junior High School teacher, began her political ca-reer in 1972 when she was elected to the charter commission. She presently is serving as mayor pro-tem and was next in line to serve as the city's

mayor.
"I have reset my priorities and have decided that my family and friends come first," said Mrs. Dudley.
