

60-40 Recreation Bond Plan Passes In Senate

All three Observerland state senators backed enabling legislation for a \$100 million recreation bond issue as it passed the Senate last week 32-4.

The bill would split the funds to favor local communities. Local aid would amount to \$60 million, and the state would get \$40 million.

The 60-40 split had been favored by Gov. Milliken. Conservationists had favored a 70-30 split favoring state projects, and Detroit leaders had wanted an 80-20 split favoring urban areas.

Voting for the 60-40 program were Sens. N. Lorraine Beebe (R-Deerborn Heights), whose district includes Redford; George Kuhn (R-West Bloom-

field), whose district covers Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth; and William Faust (D-Westland), who also represents Garden City.

The \$100 million for state projects would be broken down this way:

- \$27 million for state parks.
- \$6 million for fisheries projects.
- \$5 million for wildlife projects.
- \$2 million for forest recreation projects.

Bass Hit Crawler Harness

The famed nightcrawler harness is the bait that's producing black bass in southeastern Michigan this season.

Lake Orion and Lakeville Lake were the good spots last week, according to the Pontiac district office of the Natural Resources Department.

Bluegills, in shallow water for spawning, were hitting poppers, the tiny artificial bait used with light tackle. Lakeville and Pontiac lakes were cited as good producers.

In general, fishing was below par during recent unsettled, sometimes blustery weather. Activity was light on Lake St. Clair, in particular, although it will increase now that muskie season has opened there. Anchor Bay produced a dozen muskies in the 20-25 pound class in the opening days.

Archers shooting carp reported good success on the Huron River at Pointe Mouillee. Natural Resources officers, working with the Oakland County Duck Hunters Club, reported some success in getting wood ducks to lay eggs in nesting boxes built by club members last winter.

One box had as many as 37 eggs in it, DNR officers reported. New broods are hatching daily.

But State Sen. Robert Huber, conservative Republican from Troy, charged that the compromise version "violates the intent of the people who voted on it."

Conservation interests had campaigned for the bond issue on the basis of the 70-30 state-local split, even though it wasn't legally binding on the Legislature.

Jacobson Wins Art Scholarship

Robert W. Jacobson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jacobson of 17369 Centralia, Redford Township, has received one of 16 Michigan State University Creative Arts Scholarships.

A graduate of Redford Union High School, he received an art scholarship and will major in art practice at MSU. In order to earn the scholarship, Jacobson submitted at least five works in either painting or sculpture which were judged by the MSU art department faculty.

Lake Ships Detailed In Display

A special exhibit, "The Lake Ship Profile," ink and watercolor drawings of historic Great Lakes ships by contemporary artist Frank R. Crevier, is

currently on display at the Dossin Great Lakes Museum on Belle Isle. Crevier, a lifelong resident of the St. Clair River district

has a rare understanding of the vessels he has depicted, all in broadside profile, with the exacting accuracy that reflects his engineering background. There are 30 selected studies, including such well-known ships as the excursion steamers Frank E. Kirby, Tashmoo, Owana, and the Niagara of Perry's 1812 Lake Erie Fleet.

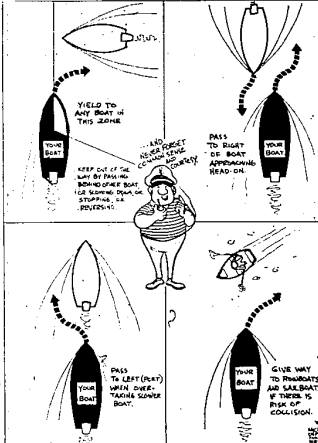
The exhibit will continue through June, and the museum is open Wednesday thru Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5:45 p.m.

Muzzle Loaders 'Fire' At Village

Greenfield Village will be the site of the annual assemblage of Indians, frontiersmen, soldiers from the Civil War -- both Yankees and Rebels -- and Minutemen June 21 and 22. They'll be rehearsing there with their muzzle loading rifles, carbines, hallocks and long rifles for the 15th annual Muzzle Loaders Festival.

Visitors to this year's Festival will find colorful costumes and fascinating displays, fast-march drilling and keen competition. The whole family will enjoy the demonstrations of gun making, powderhorn making and bullet molding.

A lively parade through the Village to the shooting area begins each day's activities. With banners and flags flying, the participants march briskly to the village of the Revolutionary War. Each is dressed in period costume appropriate to the era. When they will be shooting. The weapons and costumes range from the Revolutionary War to the Civil War era.

ON SATURDAY individual non-official "shooters" -- women -- as well as men -- compete. They shoot at various kinds of targets from various distances, under the rules of the

National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association.

On Sunday the military units take over and shoot under the rules of the North-South skirmish Association. The long lines of participants are an awesome sight as they take careful aim. Dense smoke often envelops them when the charge explodes.

Between shooting relays on both days, special events enhance the matches. These include band concerts, costume judging and a special demonstration by the world-famous Zouaves from Jackson, Mich.

SPECIAL demonstrations and exhibits are set up throughout the day's activities which run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Visitors can see a Civil War Union camp site with a complete medical tent, and one of the largest displays of Remington guns known. They can watch craftsmen engraving guns or carving wood or doing scrimshaw work and, of course, they can tour the 100 historic buildings in Greenfield Village and see many craftsmen practicing their skills of an earlier day. This will be the 15th annual Muzzle Loaders Festival at Greenfield Village.
