We read so many articles pro and con on censorship - some very logical thoughts on the subject have been expressed by D. E. Ten Dyke of Grand Rapids. The United States Constitution provides for freedom of speech, and guarantees liberty. Liberty, however, is not license, which Webster describes as "excessive, undisciplined freedom, constituting an abuse of liberty."

Mr. Ten Dyke points out that, for example, free or at liberty to operate an automobile, but to do so when drunk is license. We are at liberty to protest if we think we are being abused, but to exercise that protest by locking up the college dean is license. We are at liberty to publish certain material which is helpful, but to publish smutty, salacious or pornographic material is license. Obviously, there are many people these days who are unable or unwilling to differentiate between liberty and license, including some of our censors. Censorship can't be abolished. It is a discipline that is always with us in one form or another. It always has been and always will be. The alternative is chaos.

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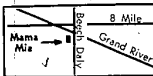

Mrs. Butler has been a third grade teacher here for 15 years. She retires from Flanders, but previously taught at Middle Bell. Her husband has been employed in the accounting department at the administration building. But this was not to be his destiny when he first arrived in Farmington back in 1954.

He came here from a superintendency in Seward and was assigned to be the new principal at City School when it opened. While they waited for their Farmington Rd. residence to be completed they lived in a motel, Mrs. Butler recalls.

Shortly after they had moved into their new home, an auto accident and a stroke - it was never determined whether one triggered the other - caused a decided change in their plans. Butler was physically incapacitated and spent four semesters at the University of Michigan clinic attempting to have his speech restored.

When this proved unsuccessful, doctors at the clinic suggested that a job be found for him in some other department of the district. That's how it happens that both of the Butlers are now retiring at the same time.

They are looking forward to some long-postponed traveling. Their daughter, a University of Michigan graduate, is married to a forest ranger who does analytical research for a firm in Iron Mountain, and there are three grandchildren waiting for a visit.

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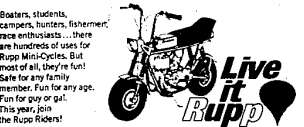
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
