Farmington Dad Is King Of Patio Cooks

Father's Day or any other, William Graves of Farmington is king of the family patio at 31751 Marblehead.

But now this father of three lively young sons reigns as King of the Patio for all southeastern Michigan.

His tasty barbecue specialty, Medallions of Veal Oscar, won first place Tuesday in the finals of Detroit Edison's King of the Patio contest for men who like to cook outdoors.

GRAVES, A SALESMAN for American Sterilizer Co., has enjoyed barbecue cooking for 10 years and for the last five has entered the Edison competition, finishing in the finals four times.

"But this is the first time I entered a recipe that wasn't my own," he said, explaining that the boneless veal dish that is served with crab legs and Bearnaise sauce came from a Salt Lake City restaurant.

He tried it out just once on the Graves home barbeque equipment that soon will be replaced by the handsome electric char-grill console and serving cart that he won for his expert cookery.

explained, "But at the cook-off I tried to keep it warm and it melted down."

"I guess it still tasted good enough to win. One of the judges told me it was the first time they'd been well agreed on the first place winner."

MRS. PEGGY GRAVES, who was on hand for the cook-off, said the dish rated raves from other wives who had the chance to taste it.

Mrs. Graves is a former home economics teacher, so her husband has had some expert advice on the way to becoming patio king.

Three other Observer area men also were finalists in the contest. They were William Adams, 30904 Gladys, Westland; Clifton Haley, 14208 Sarasota, Redford Township; and Winston Kyle, 14563 Country Club Drive, Livonia.

Here's the winning recipe as cooked by William Graves:

MEDALLIONS OF VEAL OSCAR

1 1/2 pounds boneless veal, leg or rump
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
12 ounces fresh crab legs, shelled
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 well beaten egg
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup Sauterne
1 cup Bearnaise Sauce

Cut veal into 9 pieces. Flatten with a mallet. Combine flour, salt and pepper; coat veal. Dip crab meat in 2 tablespoons flour, then in beaten egg, and finally in bread crumbs. Set aside. Fry veal in 2 tablespoons of the butter till golden brown. Remove to a warm platter. Simmer sauterne in hot skillet for 1 minute and pour over veal. Place veal uncovered in a low oven to keep warm. In another

skillet fry crab in remaining butter till brown. Remove from heat, keep warm. Place reheating teaspoon Bearnaise Sauce over each piece of veal; top with crab. Pass additional sauce. Serves 4-6.

BEARNAISE SAUCE

4 egg yolks
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash cayenne pepper
1 cup melted butter
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons minced onion
2 teaspoons minced parsley
1 teaspoon dried tarragon

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored; add salt, cayenne. Add 1/2 cup melted butter, about a teaspoon at a time, beating constantly. Combine remaining 1/2 cup melted butter with lemon juice. Slowly add about 2 teaspoons at a time, the remaining ingredients, to the yolk mixture. Makes 1/2 cup.

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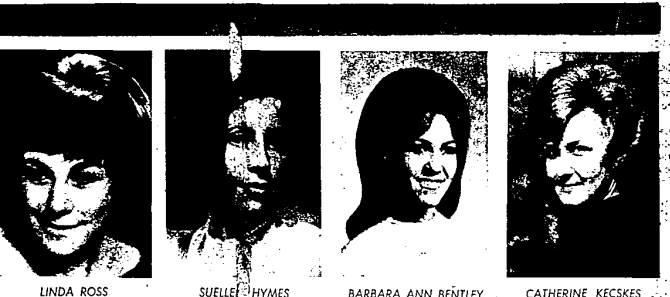
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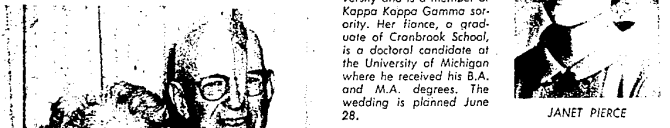


LINDA ROSS
