

## Bennett to be ordained as deacon

Gerald L. Bennett, Farmington resident and active methods of St. Andrew Episcopal Church of Livonia, will be ordained as a deacon in the Episcopal Church Saturday, July 9.

The ordination will take the east 10 a.m. in St. Andrew, 1636 Hubbard and will culminate nine years of study in the Episcopal School of Theology in the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Detroit.

Bennett, an assistant principal in the East Detroit school district, plans to continue his studies to ordination as an Episcopal priest.

He then will be eligible to serve as an non-stipendiary clergyman, prob-ably assisting without pay in an area church, while continuing his full-time school career.

At St. Andrew, Bennett has served as vestryman, choir member, lay reader and church school teacher.

Bennett attended Albion College. Wayne State University and Eastern Michigan University and holds a BA in speech, an MA in counseling and an educational specialist degree in ad-ministration.

His wife is an elementary principal the Farmington school district.


