

Sports Weekend hosted by St. John

Armenian youth will meet in a General Assembly and Sports Weekend on the Labor Day holiday at St. John's Armenian Church in Southfield.

Kelly: In high school, smoking isn't cool

A ruling by State Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley will probably put a damper on Marlboro Country in Southfield schools.

Kelley ruled last month that students under 18 should not be allowed to smoke cigarettes in public schools. School boards permitting minors to smoke in school will be subject to possible fines or imprisonment, he said.

In recent years, both Southfield high schools have established areas outside the schools where smoking is permitted for students 18 and older. Younger students have also taken advantage of the areas, school officials admit.

Southfield Sup't. Carl Hassel said he is requesting principals at Southfield-Lathrup and Southfield High to review Kelley's opinion and suggest merited changes.

Southfield-Lathrup's present student policy says students 18 and older may smoke in designated areas outside the building. Students caught inside are suspended or subject to other disciplinary actions. In addition, parents are notified. The school policy, although in keeping with Kelley's ruling, was written well before the ruling was issued.

ACCORDING to assistant principal Harold Pegals, the biggest problems will probably come in trying to sort out those students in the smoking areas who are not 18.

At Southfield High, students who are 18 can smoke under guidelines similar to those at Southfield-Lathrup. But there, too, officials predict some problems separating the minors from those who can legally smoke on school property.

Kelley issued his ruling in response to a request from State Reps. Paul Rosenbaum (D-Battle Creek) and Warren Gorman (D-Roseville).

"A board of education may not knowingly designate a certain area of school property to be available to minors smoking cigarettes," Kelley wrote.

Kelley noted that a 1915 state law makes it illegal for anyone under 18 to smoke in a public place. Young persons caught publicly smoking may be arrested, the law says.

The law also makes it illegal for anyone knowingly to permit minors to smoke on his property. However, parents may allow their children to smoke at home.

Violators of the law are subject to punishment, or imprisonment.

The law has not been vigorously enforced in Southfield nor in most other communities throughout the state. Even junior high school and some elementary school children have taken to openly smoking.
