CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS
Summary of Proceedings
City Council Meeting
August 8, 1977

The City Council of Farmington Hills met in regular session at City Hall on August 8, 1977. Mayor Dudley called the meeting to order at 8:00 P.M. Council members present were: Amori, Deacon, Dolan and Oppertbauer. Mr. Lichtman was out of town on business and Mrs. Smith was on vacation. Others present were: City Manager Majors, City Clerk Cairns, and City Attorney Bibeau.

September 12, 1977 set as date for consideration by Farmington Hills Housing Commission regarding RCMS and RCE-1 proposed Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance creating senior citizens housing districts; attendance of the Planning Commission was also requested.

City Manager Majors introduced 1977 Girls State and Boys State Representatives Julie Markovich and Bret Howell.

Senior Citizen Transportation Proposal as submitted by the Farmington Hills Commission on Aging accepted by a vote of 3 to 2. Mr. Deacon and Mrs. Dudley opposed.

Legal advertising requirement waived and contract unanimously awarded for purchase of 1977 3/4 ton pickup truck for the Department of Public Services from GMC Truck and Coach Division in the amount of \$2,054.75.

Low bid waived for the purchase of one (1) nine ton flat bed trailer; second low bid by Case Power and Equipment Co. in the amount of \$2,995 unanimously accepted.

Low bid by Cyril J. Burke, Inc. in the amount of \$5,885 to purchase one trailer mounted compressor for the Department of Public Services unanimously accepted.

Legal advertising requirement unanimously waived for the purchase of two (2) four passenger jeep-type vehicles from Art Moran Pontiac-GMC, Inc. in the amount of \$11,685.

City Attorney directed to report back to Council regarding the proposed SEMTA (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority) agreement establishing the location and maintenance contract for new bus shelters.

Proposal for pavement recycling on Inkster Road from 13 Mile Road north to 600 feet south of 14 Mile Road by Ajax Paving Company at a cost of \$1,300 for materials only unanimously accepted.

1977 Joint and crack sealing program contract awarded to low bidder T.C. Smith & Company, Inc. in the amount of \$35,568.18 by a vote of 3 to 2. Mr. Amori and Mrs. Dudley opposed.

Legal advertising requirement waived and contract unanimously awarded to Tom Holzer Ford, Inc. for the purchase of a pick-up truck for the Parks and Recreation Department in the amount of \$5,941.

Legal advertising requirement waived and contract awarded unanimously to Motorola, Inc. for the purchase of radio equipment for the Police Division in the amount of \$6,584.

Purchase of a parcel of land (5 acres) located at the northwest corner of I-696 Freeway and the Middlebelt Road easement from the Department of State Highways and Transportation for \$50 unanimously approved.

Parade Permit for the Harrison High School Homecoming Parade for Saturday October 8, 1977 at 12:30 P.M. unanimously granted.

S.A.D. established for road paving in Meadowbrook Heights Subdivision (Willow Lane, Dresden, Sotthen and List Streets).

S.A.D. established for sewer improvements on Moran Street in Supervisor's Middlebelt Ten Mile Road Plat No. 1.

Public Hearing date set for August 22, 1977 regarding costs for road improvements in Woodcreek Hills Subdivision (excluding Outlot A and Lot 8).

Amendment to City Code Sections 4.180, 4.186, and 4.170 of Article 1 regarding the employee retirement system unanimously introduced.

Hiring of Ben Iden, relative of another CEFTA employee, under the CEFTA Program unanimously approved.

Discussion to consider removal of Bernard Christy from the Housing Commission resolved by accepting Mr. Christy's verbal resignation made August 2, 1977 by a vote of 3 to 2. Mr. Amori and Mrs. Dudley opposed.

Appointments of Robert Clarke to the Industrial and Economic Development Commission, Katherine Briggs and Marlow Belanger to the Farmington Area Arts Commission, Marsha Noons and James Donlon to the Pension Committee, Nimeh AbuNasser to the Building Board of Appeals, Charlie McLaughlin to the Housing Commission, Joy Markham to the Committee to Increase Voter Participation, and Katherine Briggs, Floyd Geringer, Han Fox, Grew Geringer, Mary Legg, Al Nothman, Robert Rowe and Stella Stray to the Historical Commission unanimously approved.

Summary of Proceedings
City Council Meeting
August 22, 1977

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills met in regular session at City Hall on August 22, 1977. Mayor Dudley called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. Council Members present were: Amori, Deacon, Dolan, Lichtman and Smith. Mr. Oppertbauer was on vacation. Others present were: City Manager Majors, City Clerk Cairns, and City Attorney Bibeau.

Mayor Dudley proclaimed October 15, 1977 not only as Sweetest Day but also as "Happiness Day."

After Public Hearing, the Master Parks and Recreation Plan for the City of Farmington Hills was unanimously adopted.

After Cost Hearing, Special Assessment Roll in amount of \$116,000 for road resurfacing in Woodcreek increase to \$2.82 per 1,000 cubic feet of metered water consumption approved by a vote of 4 to 1. Mr. Lichtman opposed.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. 028-98 a request to rezone 2 acres located on the west side of Halstead Road between Grand River and Eleven Mile Road from (RA-1) Single Family Residential to (LI-1) Light Industrial use unanimously enacted.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. 028-99 a request to rezone 4.79 acres located on the west side of Halstead Road between Grand River Avenue and Eleven Mile Road from (RA-1) Single Family Residential to (LI-1) Light Industrial use unanimously enacted.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. 028-100 a request to rezone 187 acres located between Haggerty and Halstead Roads from 13 1/2 Mile to 14 Mile Roads from (RA-1) Single Family Residential to (PR-2) Planned Residential use enacted by a vote of 5 to 1. Mrs. Dudley opposed.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. 028-101 a request to rezone property located between Haggerty and 1475 Expressway on the southeast corner of Elm and Haggerty Roads from (RA-1) Single Family Residential to (OS-1A) Office Service use unanimously enacted.

Amendment No. C-177 to Municipal Code Section 14.1280 regarding the enforcement of sewage tank violations unanimously enacted.

Resolutions of Amendment No. 027-77 to City Code Sections 4.130, 4.140, and 4.170 of Article 1 regarding the employee retirement system unanimously tabled until September 12, 1977.

Consideration of transfer of ownership of 1977 Class C and SDM licensed business at 2914 Grand River from Louis Waack Estate to O.J. Enterprises, Inc. tabled until September 12, 1977.

Mr. Deacon left the meeting due to illness at 10:54 P.M.

Legal advertising requirement waived for the purchase of a Hurst Power Rescue Tool "Jaws of Life" for the Fire Division in the amount of \$5,100.

Final Preliminary Plat for Meadowlawn Subdivision consisting of 254 lots on 121 acres located on the northwest corner of Halstead and Nine Mile Roads unanimously approved.

Final Preliminary Plat for Independence Expressway Service Center Subdivision located on the northeast corner of Halstead Road and Grand River Avenue unanimously approved.

Minimum employment standards for the Police Division unanimously approved. Participation in the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund litigation suit, challenging the Federal Act with City financial contribution being got greater than \$2,500, unanimously approved.

Consideration of creating an Engineering Board of Appeals died due to lack of motion.

Necessity hearing date set for September 19, 1977 for sewer improvements in Elm Grove Valley Supervisor's North Farm Park Farm Plat Number 1 and Supervisor's Noblebrook Farms Plat Number 2.

Homecoming parade permit for North Farmington High School on Saturday, October 15, unanimously approved.

Traffic Control Order No. 2.D.22.7.1 establishing no parking at any time on the north side of the service drive in front of the Farmington Hills City Hall unanimously approved.

Traffic Control Order No. 2.D.22.7.2 establishing no parking 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on the south side of the service drive in front of the Farmington Hills City Hall unanimously approved.

Meeting adjourned at 12:53 A.M.
