She is a member of the National Association of Social Work-

She pointed out that the AJC is an issue-oriented, action-oriented organization for men and women which seeks to study, to be informed and to inform others. Bringing their wares to the mart will be Dorothy Thompson, of Farmington, and Pauline Work of Farmington Hills.

Something new for the mart this year will be antique appraiser Rae Choma, known to persons in this area for her seminars in Farmington Community Center, who will give an appraisal on items brought to her.

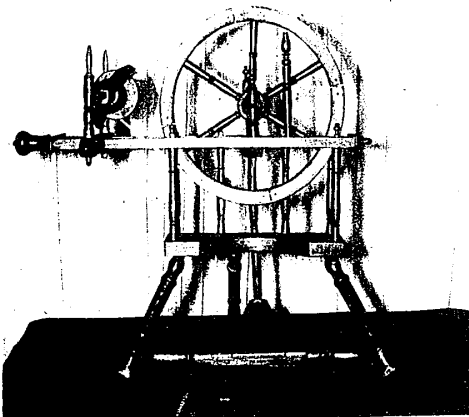
MRS. THOMPSON brings a fine collection of brass and copper to the mart, as well as small wood items she purchased on her last visit to England.

She and her husband travel to England twice a year on buying excursions. One of her recent finds is a small Scottish spinning wheel, dated 1770, that is in perfect working order. Another is a large copper tea urn, dated 1860. Her large collection of brass candlesticks is said always to attract attention from guests.

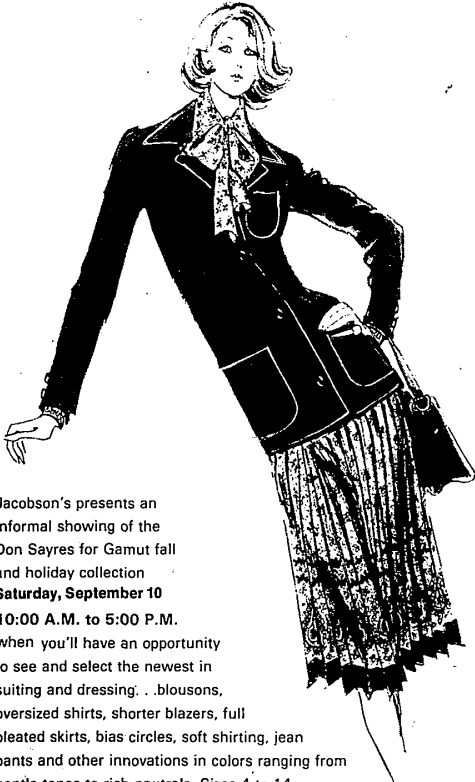
Ms. Work has been showing at the Plymouth mart for the past 14 years, and is a district director of the National Association of Antique Dealers. This year she brings a collection of Georgian, Victorian and Art Nouveau jewelry.

Also among her wares are sterling handled button books, a service for 10 of Georgian pattern sterling flatware, a collection of Meerschaum and Roma pipes, and the in-fashion accessory of the day, a collection of stick pins.
