"Also the physiological motivation of the athlete was much discussed, how much can they take, how much weight they can carry, how many sprints can they do. Each day we went through both aspects."

IN THE AFTERNOON they'd go through skating drills which would implement some of the physiology. The drills would emphasize agility on ice, tumbling, jumping.

"These drills supposed to develop agility, balance and courage. When you're jumping at high speeds, you must perform a skill movement, but it also takes a lot of courage."

The Soviet system implements these skills to a high degree, says Kelley. Each player has a purpose that fits into the Soviet's team play.

Soviet students of athletics begins training at age seven—and stays at a boarding school during that time. There they learn all the drills and the training to make an athlete. Before they get on the ice, they practice Soviet dry land training. This is running, gymnastics stretching—anything to prepare for what must be done on ice.

"It's very impressive and an interesting way to teach. I think," says Kelley. "A lot of American athletes would like to be a part of a system like this I think, but we don't pool our resources to make the best athletes we can,"

KELLEY IS VERY impressed with the Soviet method of training, and he plans on bringing some of the methods that he learned back to Cranbrook.

"There's certain areas! hope to employ, not only to win more games, but for the athlete to reach his full potential both physiologically and psychologically."
