A battle seems to be brewing over the fate of Wayne County General Hos-pital's psychiatric and long-term care facilities.

The battle pits the county board of ommissioners and the State of Michcommissioners and the State of Mich-igan against the psychiatric hospital's director. Dr. Morteza Minui, and Local 25 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Em-ployees, which, with 1.450 members, is the largest bargaining unit at the bosoital.

Board Chairman John Barr (D-Dearborn Heights) calls the "inevitable" closure of the hospital and takeover by the state of impetited psychiatric treatment in western Wayne County, members of Local 25 have formed a task force to oppose those plans. The task force currently is circulating petitions and questionnaires about care at the hospital, and Local 25 President Robert Updike has urged his members to ask rare alegislators for their support in preventing a change in the hospital's operation. Tentative plans, which Barr said could be implemented this fall, call for the state to purchase the \$10 million Walter Reuther long-term care facility, which also is located on Wayne County General grounds at Merriman and Michigan Avenue in Westland. The hospital shift apparently has been prompted by the county's financial wees, high operating costs at Wayne County General and by the Date and county's inability to reach a Spintract agreement for funding psychiatric care in western Wayne County.

Dr. Minui believes if costs like those were lowered, the operating cost per patient in the psychiatric facility would decrease. Those costs would still be absorbed by the county, however.

"I don't believe it's inevitable until the state passes the legislation (for the takeover)." Local 25 president Robert Upfdie told local members. "I intend to make every effort to see it intend to make every effort to see it doesn't happen. I think the mental bealth act can provide for a contract to operate this facility by the Detroit Wayne County Mental Health Board."

Updike, acknowledging the need to reduce operating costs at the hospital could be "saved as a county function by cutting costs."




