 West led the three of hearts.

He displayed excellent declarer technique, and with very good defense, to land the game contract. West's hand led assured eight tricks or one short of the contract. The club king was cashed and when East showed out, declarer knew that West held eight clubs.

The diamond ace was played and West's hand became an open page: one spade, four hearts, no diamonds and eight clubs. The spade ace was played and then the queen of hearts.

West did not play the king. If he took the trick, he could cash the two hearts, but with nothing left but clubs would have led into declarer's tenace.

Declarer was equal to the challenge. He cashed the other high diamonds and played a diamond. East cashed the three high diamonds, but now had to concede two more spade tricks.
