SEMTA offers shelter to Hills bus passengers

Farmington area passengers waiting for a Southeast Michigan Transport Authority (SEMTA) bus may have a roof over their beads in the near future.

Whether five SEMTA-paid bus shelters will be located in Farmington tills hinges on whether SEMTA will agree to relieve the city of a contractual obligation to maintain the shelters, if that proves too expensive. SEMTA will pay for the construction of the transparent bus shelters, but insurance and maintenance costs will be the city's insurance and maintenance costs will be the city's responsibility. tain the shelters," Cmty Mgr. George Majoros told the council. City Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) employees could take care of the maintenance, including snow and debris removal and clean-up, but he federal money which pays their wages will run out as of June 30, 1978. The city expects to see the CETA grants renewed, but that is no certainty.

ALTHOUGH Mayor Joan Dudley was reluctant to look a gift horse in the mouth, she did just that.

"I don't want to have a problem with neglected bus shelters," she said. "Is there some way to get out of this agreement?"

City Atty. Paul Bibeau agreed that the city should have a termination

clause. If he can't negotiate one, the council will take up the bus sheller question at a future meeting. The bus sheller project will go ahead. If the legal resources fail, the council will take up the question again at a future meeting.

The proposed shelters will be located on the southwest corner of Fourteen Mile and Middlebelt; the southeast corner of Twelve Mile and Middlebelt; the northwest corner of Thirteen Mile and Middlebelt; the northwest corner of Thirteen Mile and Orchard Lake Rd.; and on Thirteen Mile between Orchard Lake Road and Middlebelt.

The locations were determined by a SEMTA ridership survey, which indicated the Fourteen Mile-Middle-belt locations was the most popular point, averaging 113 riders per week.
