Eighty per cent of the younger TV viewing audience will ask for toys and games they see advertised, according to Charles Alkin, communication professor at Michigan State University. He says that there is about a 50 per cent increase in toy and game advertising during the three to four week pre-holiday period.

"The ads are skillfully created, sometimes giving false impressions and hope to children," said Atkin. "Beautiful dolls that talk, bionic toys, and stunt motorcycle or army toys sometimes fall into this category."

Children may want the toys they see advertised, but parents don't have to feel trapped into purchasing every toy their child requests. Alkins suggests that children be included in the decision-making process. For example,

children could set their own priorities in their gift list.

"Parents often buy as many as 10 or 2 gifts for their children, and by letting them set priorities, disappointment or controversy probably will not occur." says Atkin.


